Rector's Notes – DECEMBER 2018



Advent – how can we get ready?

What are to be the marks of this Advent season?

Outward marks include Advent calendars, candles, or wreaths / crowns. But inwardly? In a few weeks we'll be singing *O holy child of Bethlehem be born in us today* – how can we get ready to make that invitation to Jesus?

I've been reading some thoughts of Michael Perham, former Bishop of Gloucester, who suggests these aspects of preparation:

HOPE — not crossing our fingers and hoping for the best! Perhaps EXPECTANCY is a better word — confident and urgent faith. Just as God acted then, so he is at work today. We're to be awake and alert — watching for signs of his kingdom now, and joining in where we see God at work!

STRUGGLE: not only do many of the scripture passages in Advent season services talk of struggle, but God's wind of change blowing through the Church today keeps challenging our old assumptions. Israel had been waiting for a Messiah and when he finally came he was so unlike what many had been expecting that they missed him completely. What new, perhaps challenging, thing might God want to do in our churches today that we're in danger of missing? Maybe God wants to move us on from some of the ways we've always done things. It wouldn't be the first time.

REPENTANCE – John the Baptist is part of the Advent readings saying Repent! Not so much 'giving up sinning', but turning around; looking at things in a whole new light. Accepting the gospel may shake us up, but surely what's most important are God's purposes, not our comfort?!

And then RESPONSE. When Gabriel comes to Mary with that utterly life-changing news, she responds 'Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word.' Joseph too completely changes his plans because God speaks to him in a dream. This Advent, what is our response to God coming among us?

It's quite hard not to get completely caught up in the commercial Advent theme of buying presents and other practical preparations for Christmas. But if we can pause to consider these themes of expectancy, struggle, repentance and our own response, then when Christmas Day finally comes, surely our joy and wonder at God with us will be all the greater.

Christmas Traditions

A 2017 UK poll commissioned by Costa Coffee found that eight years old is the age we most enjoy Christmas and that 68 per cent of us would like to see a return to traditional Christmas values and rituals. The poll of 2,000 adults found that many us long for the days when making homemade mince pies and going to pantomimes were the norm. I certainly remember the excitement of going to the pantomime when I was a child. We would book a box at the theatre in Cardiff that could fit three generations of family from grandparents to several grandchildren and being entertained by The Krankies and even SuperTed!

Each family will have their own Christmas customs and rituals that grow and decline over time. My birthday is on 1 December, and it was "tradition" for the Christmas fairy lights to go up around the fireplace on my special day, although I am fairly sure that this ritual faded out in my late teenage years. Since owning our own house and being fully-fledged grown-ups, we buy a new Christmas bauble each year that has a special memory or place attached. I know of some families who have a "PJ Day" and spend Christmas day in their pyjamas, and I have other friends who jet off to sunnier climes.

In the week leading up to Christmas last year, we went on a short break to Iceland and discovered a rather strange tradition. As well as a visit from Father Christmas on Christmas Eve, Iceland also has thirteen mischievous Yule Lads who come down from the mountains to cause trouble in the nights leading up to Christmas. Originating from Icelandic folklore, the Yule Lads are trolls who range from being mere pranksters to monsters who eat children.

In modern times, the Yule Lads have taken on a role similar to Father Christmas and come one by one in the night-time to leave gifts in well-behaved children's shoes placed on the window-sills. If a child has been naughty, they receive a rotting potato! The first visit is on 12 December, and the final visit is on Christmas Eve – each Yule Lad "comes to town" for thirteen nights, and the last troll leaves on 6 January. The English translations of the Yule Lads names are amusing, e.g. Bowl-Licker, Door-Slammer, Sausage-Swiper and Window-Peeper! Icelanders have many other Christmas traditions, but my favourite is the tradition of giving books to each other (Jolabokaflod or Christmas Book Flood) on Christmas Eve and spending the night reading.

Over recent months, we have endeavoured to use as little single-use plastic at home as we possibly can — there are times when it seems sadly unavoidable. I have decided that Christmas will be no different and I will start the new tradition of a "No(el) Plastic" — no glitter, no plastic shrink wrap, no cellophane wrapping paper etc. A calendar clash means that I will not be able to go to Falmouth's Plastic Free Christmas event in December, but I am reading a lot of online articles and blogs as part of my "No(el) Plastic" preparation.

Many thanks to Pat Williams who organised the event to mark the 100th anniversary of the end of WWI on Friday 9th November. As well as a display of photographs, memorabilia and sample of WWI food, the Daylight Choir joined us and performed well-known wartime songs. The choir was established in 2015 as part of the St Day clock renovation project and they were a fantastic addition to the evening.

Christmas at Christchurch

Our first Christmas event will be our Carol Service on Tuesday 11th December at 7pm. Our "resident" band, Skyliner, will accompany the carols and performing a few Christmas jazz classics. Money raised from the service will go towards "Help Felix Eat" — Felix is the one-year old son of Skyliner's previous bass player. Felix was born with a deep airway blockage that took 28 minutes to clear. During this time, his brain was starved of oxygen and he now has cerebral palsy. Felix loves food, but unfortunately his cerebral palsy means he can only swallow very smooth and slippery puree. He has had speech and language therapy since birth but this has not been enough to help him learn to eat a wider variety of textures. His family would now like to take him to the New Jersey Paediatric Feeding Associates, a specialist clinic in the United States. Felix's family need to raise money to pay for his two-week treatment, accommodation and flights.

Further events include the Christmas Bazaar on Saturday 15th December at 2pm, Christmas Eve services (Crib Service, 3pm, and Bethlehem Mass, 8pm), and a Christmas Day Mass at 10am.

On 11 November, Revd Jo led a very poignant Remembrance Service and we were once again delighted to have Bernard Pearce from Redruth Town Band sound the Last Post and Reveille. At 12.30pm our bell ringers rang, joining many towers throughout the land to commemorate 100 years since the cessation of the First World War. You may have seen elsewhere that St Euny Church is currently fundraising for a Public Access Defibrillator which will be housed outside the church building in the grounds. At 10.45 am on Remembrance Sunday, 11th November, a very good crowd gathered to watch the unveiling of the village Centenary Memorial Plaque, beautifully crafted by Andrew Rogers, on the new Four Lanes Post Office extension. The names of the World War I Fallen were read and a wreath laid, followed by the Last Post played by Jordan, who then played the Reveille after the customary two minutes' silence. Following a procession to St. Andrew's lych gate memorial, a short Act of Remembrance included the laying of three more wreaths and another on the grave of S. Brown, who died shortly after the end of the War in 1918. The Holy Communion service at 11.30 am included a reading by Cllr. Bob Drew, Chairman of Carn Brea Parish Council and was followed by lunch (World War I menu of Bovril & Marmite drinks, sausages, mashed potatoes and beans, then roly poly pudding and custard), at the Methodist Church, accompanied by wartime songs and personal and press memorabilia from 1918. Our sincere thanks go to Jenny and Caroline for their hard work in preparing all the food and to everyone who helped create a most memorable day.

The next LAMP First Sunday Evening Event will be held at 6 pm on Advent Sunday 2nd December, at Four Lanes Methodist Church, led by Lucie Rogers, who will be joined by the 'Tin & Tonic' Community Choir, celebrating Advent with seasonal items. Our Annual Christmas Tree Exhibition will begin with staging on Friday and Saturday 7th and 8th December and will run until the traditional 'Twelfth Night' on Saturday, 5th January. If you wish to join us for the first time, or to withdraw from the Exhibition, please inform Jill by 2nd December. If there is no change, arrangements will stay the same as before and a site will be reserved for you as usual. Our Christmas Bazaar will be held in Pencoys Hall from 12 noon on Saturday,

8th December, when seasonal soup and sweet lunches will be served and good quality gifts and Christmas items will be on sale. 

All together at St Andrew's, Redruth

How many people, I wonder, have maintained a spiritual or emotional connection to church through hymns and especially carols? Many of us who attend church regularly now have known phases or stages of life when that wasn't the case: for some, the pressures of raising a family or the demands of work made commitment every Sunday seem impossible, while others were deterred by the natural doubts that are a



challenging part of faith. And how many of us, at times when we could not, or would not, go to church, found ourselves singing hymns at the kitchen sink or in the car? How many found tears welling at the sound of a Salvation Army band playing in a busy town centre full of Christmas shoppers?

The music of church, and particularly the traditional hymns and carols that we remember from childhood, calls us into fellowship, community, and faith. Some may say that this is simply a nostalgic yearning for the familiar, and that may be part of the appeal, but might that not be too simplistic a reading of the powerful impact of such music on so many of us?

We certainly experienced the power of voices in harmony when we hosted our Festival of Remembrance on 10 November and the annual Remembrance Sunday Service: both filled the church with the sound of music, whether sung by the talented Celtic Male Ensemble and ROAST singers, or by the gathered assemblies. What better way to honour the fallen than in the words of much-loved hymns that they too would have known and sung.

Now we prepare for Advent and Christmas. Our ever-popular Christmas Market was held on 24 November in the crypt. As usual St Andrew's is proud to host Christmas concerts by Trewirgie and Redruth Schools, and the Celtic Male Ensemble concert on 20 December, and this year, on 3 December, we also host an RAF Advent Carols event. Our own Carol Service, with Redruth Town Band, is at 6 pm on Sunday 16 December. How wonderful to look forward to a festive season when, with our friends and neighbours, we can fill our church with the joyful sound of Christmas!

Gardening Club at Christchurch Lanner

Do you like gardening? Why not come along and give Ken a hand the last Thursday of the Month from 10-12 at Christchurch Lanner? There are plenty of garden tools, some of which have been restored in prison workshops through the Tool Shed Project.

Inspired by the Church Times Green Health Awards and with a wonderful garden at Christchurch Lanner, it seemed a great idea to invite the local community into the garden, alongside an event already going on – gardening on Thursday mornings, once a month.

Gardeners have always understood the power of gardens and gardening to heal the mind, body and spirit, but in recent years accepted wisdom has been backed up by evidence-based research. Studies have suggested that gardening can help lower stress, combat loneliness and may even reduce the risk of dementia. With green space in towns and cities at a premium, church land is well placed to meet the need of communities for outdoor spaces which promote mental and physical health.

In January, the Government's new 25 Year Environment Plan came out and in Chapter 3, following advice from the Natural Capital Committee, it encourages; Connecting people with the environment to improve health and well-being. Furthermore, the plan invites "everyone to play a role" - an opportunity we couldn't resist.

The aim is to get people active by welcoming them to the church to undertake lovely things together such as looking after the Plum Tree or planting some herbs or seeds and general maintenance of the garden. This would ALSO contribute to the local Green Church Award Scheme categories' and would win a Bronze Award:

(Achieve three recommendations from each of the three areas below and receive a Bronze award certificate to display in your church)

CHRISTIAN LIVING

- 1. Appoint a church 'Environmental Champion' someone with a passion for environmental matters who will 'make things happen' and drive the local church towards achieving this 'Green Church Award' scheme.
- 9. Invite your Diocesan Environment Officer or a representative from one of the national charities to speak on the environment e.g. Christian Aid, A Rocha
- 10. Invite local environmental activists/specialists to speak about community green events (Nov 25th watch this space).

COMMUNITY

- 6. Allow fruit/vegetable planting on church land
- 7. Run an eco-column in the church magazine/pewsheet/website.
- 8. Install bird/insect boxes.
- 9. Set aside an area of the church grounds as a 'meadow' to encourage wildlife
- 10. Provide an eco-section on the church noticeboard

RESOURCES

- 3. Arrange for the composting of all organic materials (eg flowers and kitchen waste).
- 6. Install rain water collection.
- 9. Commit to using at least 30% LOAF ingredients (Local, Organic, Animal friendly, Fairly traded) at church functions.

As many of you know, Dave and I have been going to Jersey, in the same hotel, for the last thirty years! Many say "What again?" but we love it and have just found out we are not alone! We read in the newspaper recently of a family who have clocked up 50 years in the same Jersey hotel, the same room in fact! I don't reckon we will be able to top that!

Jersey (together with the Isles of Scilly) is our desert island! While St. Helier is bursting at the seams we are seemingly miles from anywhere, enjoying a picnic on the cliffs or admiring the breath-taking scenery. Very much like Cornwall.

Everyone knows we walk a lot so surely we must have covered every footpath and lane there is in that time? "The island is only nine miles by five," they say, "so where else is there to walk?" The answer is that we have our favourite walks, although we don't cover so many miles as we used to, and the holiday is never long enough to do all we want to. As we leave after our holiday we always seem to think of somewhere we haven't been on that particular trip, so we say "Never mind....next time!"

The next question is, surely walking is restricted on such a small island. Well, yes it could be but for some unknown reason the Jersey lanes and paths seem to go on forever. We have heard Jersey called the big little island, and so it is. Rural Jersey seems miles from anywhere. Yet another year we decided to catch the first bus out of the bus station no matter where it went, a sort of lucky dip! We found a few new paths that year!

So Jersey ticks all the boxes for a great holiday and we are about to book for next year!

MEMORIES OF WORLD WAR 1

2018 marks the centenary of the end of the First World War—'a war to end all wars' Throughout Europe the rumblings had reached a crescendo in the idyllic summer of 1914 when Briton declared war on Germany. Young men in the flower of their youth, proud to fight for their homeland and caught up in the fervour of Union Jacks, military uniforms, patriotic songs and with promises that the war would be over by that Christmas, surged forward to enlist. Even Samuel and Tom Trounson of the large Redruth local wholesalers stores (now Superdrug) promised to keep jobs open for those who volunteered, and to make up the difference of pay during the period of service, which they expected to be short. All were soon to be sadly disillusioned. The horror and senseless slaughter of trench warfare in France and Belgium lay before them.

John and Harold Kemp of Drump Rd, Redruth had emigrated as miners to Arizona in 1912 but returned to Cornwall in 1915. John was a man of above average intelligence who had left Trewirgie School at the age of fourteen. Being a miner, the army used his experience as a 'sapper', one who digs a 'sap', a tunnel to undermine an enemy position in which explosives are detonated. He rose through the ranks to 2nd Lieutenant, winning both the Military Cross and Military Medal. Many years ago, this present writer sat with his elderly sister to write down details of his background, and transcribed his diaries which he had written in the trenches. They give a vivid picture of the sufferings and death.

"Nov 12 1917 Two shells dropped right among the men. The scene that followed was awful. Five men were killed outright and seven wounded, two dying of their wounds later in the day. Some of the wounded were shouting and screaming for help—there were so many that you hardly knew who to go to first. Some had arms and legs blown off. Fritz shelled the road and dressing station all day. Altogether it has been a nightmare of a day—one of the chaps was wounded for the sixth time. A police corporal directing traffic on the Pottage Road had both legs blown off. He was quite conscious and tried to reach his revolver to shoot himself but was prevented by one of our chaps. He then begged the chap to shoot him to put him out of his pain. A few minutes afterwards he died."

A Mr Veal born in 1899, told this writer of his memories of World War One in 1982 when aged 83 years:- "I am a St Ives man. I joined the Royal Hampshire Regiment when I was 17 years old and was immediately sent to France. My first taste of war was at Ypres where I went 'over the top' several times. It was just senseless slaughter walking across no-man's land to capture a trench—a pit dug in the ground! In one attack only 200 men were left from 800 in my Battalion. As soon as we got out of our trench the Germans opened fire with machine guns and there was always barbed-wire, even though our guns had a barrage first. When advancing along the muddy tracks you saw horses blown to bits, and hands or an arm which I usually picked up and and put on one side of the track. Food was little and poor. A cook would bring two canisters of soup and a portion of bread and butter and that was all."

Such were the horrors experienced. Each time we assemble at the Victoria Park for the Remembrance Day Service I think, like others, of those local men who gave their lives and of those who survived. My late father served in the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, both as an infantry soldier and a sapper, in the Battle of the Somme, during which he and other sappers twice escaped on being buried for some time in collapsed saps. Stanley Pollard, an uncle I was never to know, served as a gunner in the Royal Artillery and died in June 1918 aged 23 years; his name is on the Park War Memorial






