Rector's notes – JULY 2022

These notes are written straight after Murdoch Day, when in spite of a dodgy weather forecast huge crowds came out to celebrate Redruth's heritage – a really 'feel-good' day! After several years wondering about it, I had finally asked David Doble to make me a faith swing-o-meter easel as a discussion starter, and I set up a stall piggy-backing on FP's bric-abrac stall next to Hatter's tea room on Fore Street. The question at the top was 'Does God Exist?' and people were invited to move a pointer to one of the answers: 'No, there is no God; Probably not; I'd like to think so; Probably, yes Yes, I know he does!

It was great to be out there, talking to people of all stages of faith and none, and we ended up with several baptism bookings and a wedding enquiry, and people wanting to know more about faith.

What it proved to me again is that many, many people are interested in faith, but that we need to find other ways to engage with them, rather than wait for them to come into our churches. Next time I think we might try a more open question (eg 'What would you say to God?'). Expect to see it at church fetes etc!

On the Way

This links to our Deanery *On the Way* plan, which moved forward a step last week, with Deanery Synod voting to support the plan before sending it up to the Bishops and Archdeacons for their approval. The plan has a very strong vision statement, which is *Living God's abundant life; sharing the good news of Jesus*. This *sharing the good news of Jesus* (what we call evangelism) is something Jesus himself tasked us with in the Great Commission at his ascension, and it's something each of us has benefited from when somebody introduced *us* to faith - whatever age that might have been. Plainly, it's the key to growing our churches too. There are all sorts of ideas afoot about how we can do this in a way that doesn't frighten people away, but rather feels inviting and natural – so stay tuned for more information, when the final plan is agreed.

A new ministry

We hope all this makes it an exciting time to start a curacy! By the time you read this, Chris Harrigan will be a freshly ordained deacon, and he and his family will have been welcomed to this brand-new start for them all. Please continue to pray for Chris, Becca, Izzy and Isaac as they adjust to life in Redruth, that God would bless them, and that their being here, in turn, would bless us and many others in our communities.

THE ANGLICAN DIACONATE

On June 24 2022 Christopher will be made a Deacon. The Diaconate is an ancient ministry beginning with the seven deacons in The Acts of the Apostles. Those Seven deacons, of which Saint Stephen was one, were chosen to make sure that the poor and the hungry were fed and cared for. The first Apostles were too busy preaching and teaching and so the deacons (the servants) were needed for pastoral care.

In the Anglican Church today, deacons are often seen as 'priests in waiting' but their ministry is much more powerful. It is an opportunity, not only to learn about priesthood, but also an opportunity to be, as said in the prayer for deacons, to be a HERALD of God's love in the 'dark places'. A deacon is not confined by the bells of the altar. A deacon can stay with the sick, and the dying, can share in joys and successes without being called to the altar. A deacon has time, time for people, time to care, time to provide. The ministry of a deacon is a wonderful chance to be with the servant of the servants of God, THE LAITY.

Deacons wear their stole across their heart as a sign of their love for the people, and as a reminder of the money bag which the first deacons carried to provide care for the outcasts. May God bless Christopher and his family as together they begin a new life in Redruth; and may God bless us all as we receive the ministry of a deacon.

ST EUNY

Thank you to all who supported our Benefice lunch for the jubilee, and a huge thank you to Liz and Dick who covered most of the catering. The Jubilee was celebrated on Sunday 5th June with a special bell ringing performance in the evening which was repeated across the country.

As well as a benefice lunch CN4C were also welcomed into the church on the Sunday following the bank holiday weekend, to celebrate with more Jubilee activities and food. Between 35 -40 people attended this event, giving them a venue for the family group to gather and feel at home.

St Euny has once again been a popular venue for weddings, with two taking place in the past month. As well as this we have regular visitors wishing to see the place where they were involved with the church family in the past or have ancestors buried in the church yard. It is good to be able to open the doors to these visitors and we are considering how we might be able to have the church open for some time for quiet prayer or reflection at times other than services.

Work on the boundary wall continues. Part has been re-built in the south section, where an unstable area was in urgent need of maintenance. There remains some of the wire fencing behind the tower and this section is due to be restored soon.

Anyone who has visited the church in the past month will have seen the scaffolding which now protects the south west corner of the church. The guinguennial report highlighted the need for some urgent attention here and we await a more detailed surveyor's report. It is clear that the church has been slipping at that corner for some time, but how recent some of the movement is remains to be confirmed. Thanks go to Charles Green for his help and expertise in producing the report and advising us. Our Health and Safety Officer (Charlie Bickford) has attended to the external woodwork which required urgent protection from damp. You might have noticed the new light bulbs in the chandeliers at St Euny. We are delighted with these - a bargain purchase by Charlie which use a substantially lower amount of electricity and are expected to last much longer than the previous type – a double win. As mentioned in the section from St Andrews we are now thinking about the logistics of the Christmas Tree Festival which we hope to hold across both churches. This will run in December and will have some events in addition to our usual Christmas Season services and activities. We will be looking for groups and organisations in town who might like to support the event by paying for and decorating a tree and who will also enjoy attending associated events. A planning group will start meeting in July and we hope to include anyone who might be interested in offering ideas, time and resources, both from the church family and form our local community. If you are interested in participating, or if you know of someone who might like to join in the planning group, please do let either me (lindabeskeen@gmail.com) or Lez Seth know and we would be delighted to include you in the team.

Sue Pearce R.I.P.

Over 45 years ago Sue and Nigel Pearce began attending St Andrew's church along with a number of other 'young people' and their children, Jeff and I among them. This proved to be a life changing experience for us all as strong bonds were created through fellowship, worship and a thirst for knowledge, bonds which have stood the test of time

Sue particularly blossomed and flourished as her faith grew, resulting in her showing great dedication in all the tasks she undertook, but her first priority was always Nigel, her children, Jeni, Anna and Bethany and of course her grandchildren as they appeared one after another.

Sue enjoyed a variety of jobs throughout her working life, often following her love of nature, music and creativity and of course these also directed her interest and service in the church. Sue has always preferred to do things in the background, not wanting to be made a fuss of, just wanting to give her best in everything she undertook.

Over those 45 plus years Sue has used her gifts and talents in many different ways; she has served three stints as Churchwarden, two with Lez Seth and one with Jim Selwood, but always in the background, shying away from being the churchwarden who stood up before the congregation to make announcements. It was really important to Sue that children learnt something about God's love for them and the stories of Jesus' ministry as a good foundation for their future, and so she worked alongside others creating an interesting and educational Sunday Club for them. For those of us who attend St Andrew's regularly we remember the custom of inviting the children to share what they'd been doing during these sessions with the whole congregation at the end of the service – but Sue kept well out of the way whilst they showed off their wonderful creations, especially the cakes, biscuit and bread. During coffee Sue would sidle amongst us quietly advising that it was in our best interests not to eat them!

She was fundamental in establishing Messy Church using her creative skills to their full extent, as well as working with Lez on a sacred space in the Lady Chapel, decorating the windows at Lent and Advent interpreting the scriptures and of course decorating the church with beautiful displays of flowers. The abundance of flowers in church for her funeral was a fitting tribute to Sue from Nigel and the girls.

Sue loved to bake and was renowned for her fantastic birthday cakes for her family and of course the wonderful mince pies at our Christmas Eve service with the children. She must have started to bake them and freeze them soon after the summer, but would you believe it – she didn't like them herself!

Another task she undertook in church for a time was sacristan. A job she loved, quietly preparing the church for communion services, keeping everything spotless and clean, making sure everything was in its right place, and at the same time enjoying the quiet prayerful

atmosphere of the church. Sue was a very important and valued member of our study group, always wanting to learn more about her faith and joining in with the Baptist church for their bible study courses. She was a very wise lady and a deep thinker.

There is much more I could say about Sue's faith and service but I'm sure you would all agree with me that Sue was a good and faithful servant, yet she worried that she was doing what God wanted her to do; how do I know she would ask, what if I'm wasting my time, should I be doing more, what does God want us to be doing in the church, why aren't we drawing more people in? You had no need to worry Sue, you did a great job.

Both Sue and Nigel have shown great love and trust in God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit especially during these last few months of Sue's illness. That same love and trust in God who loves us all will sustain Nigel, Jeni, Anna, and Bethany and their families in the days and weeks ahead.

Book Club

How time flies when you are enjoying yourself or just putting dates in your diary for weeks ahead. It's hard to believe we are halfway through the year already, so perhaps appropriate that we are sharing our thoughts on Ian Mortimer's Outcasts of Time on July 1st. Please do feel free to join us at my home at 10.15 if you enjoy reading (and talking). Below is a synopsis of the book.

In December 1248 the year the Black Death is raging through the country. The narrator, John of Wraymont, a stone carver, already a has the plague in his body and he goes in to Exeter Cathedral, his place of work, to pray for help. A disembodied angelic voice like his own offers healing and possible salvation, it at a price. "I will let you live your last six days in the distance of the future. Ninety nine years shall pass before you will return to live the first of your remaining days. Another ninety nine will pass before your second. Five hundred and ninety five years will pass before your sixth and final day, when I will come for you." He and his brother William then start their time travels around Exeter moving between the rivers Exe and Teign: Honyton, Ashburton, Wraymont, the Scorpio stone circle and Dartmoor. Each era melts invisibly into the next, ending with the horror of a bombing raise on Exeter in 1942. At last the journey is over revealing the truth that "home is not a place but a time", and that the crucial element holding all together is love.

If you want to get ahead of time (!) our next book is American Dirt by Jeanine Cummins. Lydia Quixano Perez lives a comfortable life in Acapulco with journalist husband Sebastian and her 8 year old son Luca. Lydia runs a bookstore and one day befriends a charming customer Javier, who appears to have a similar interest in books. However, Javier is revealed to be the kingpin of a drug cartel.

Sebastian publishes an expose of Javier's crimes and he and his family are consequently ordered to be slaughtered. Sebastian is killed and Lydia and Luca escape, forced to flee Mexico becoming two of countless undocumented immigrants as they undertake the dangerous journey to the United States . . .




