### Rector's Notes—June 2023

### Moving on

It was with very mixed emotions that I made the announcement a few weeks ago that Alice and I will be leaving Redruth this summer, to go to a new team rector role in Salisbury Diocese, in the Marden Vale Benefice centred on the North Wiltshire town of Calne. We are leaving lots of lovely people here in Redruth. But we are moving to be much nearer to all our close family. Our last Sunday looks like being 27<sup>th</sup> August, so we'll be around for a little while yet.

I thought it worth setting out how the process will work in relation to the appointment of my successor. The first thing to say is that the process will happen a lot more quickly than back in 2014/15. A lot of the work required towards appointing my replacement will happen before I even leave – though naturally I will have nothing to do with this. The name given for the period between incumbents is *transition*, rather than *vacancy* (or far worse, *interregnum*), because the Diocese recognises that the benefice is not vacant at all - practically everyone involved in the leading the churches is still very much in place.

We expect in the next few weeks that the Diocese will appoint a *transitions advisor*, to guide the process of producing a *parish profile* for our benefice. That person will gather a *transition team* – a group of representatives from across our churches to do the work of describing our churches as they are. The people and activities of our churches are far more important than the nature and history of our church buildings – all a new rector really wants to know about the buildings is whether they are in sound condition, and the facilities they offer.

Our churches have already adopted the deanery vision statement *Living God's abundant life; sharing the good news of Jesus*, and started to work out how that applies to our churches. That is bound to feature prominently in the profile. Then the transitions team will need to write a *role description*, and a *person specification* for those who might be interested in applying. A lot of the role is standard, because there are many things any rector has to do. But there is much scope to specify any particular experience or gifts that the transitions team feel are important in potential candidates to lead the next stage of the life of our churches.

Then the role will be advertised. I would expect interviews to be this coming autumn, and if the right person is found, hopefully they will start work in the first quarter of 2024. It's not too early to start praying that the right person be found!

### **ST ANDREW REDRUTH**

### The smallest room in St Andrew's Church

On Saturday 20 May, Jeff Saville, Rosemary and I spent an hour or two giving the sacristy a spring(ish) clean.

It is usually only the servers and clergy that enter this room and some may wonder what is in there and what is it used for.

Basically the sacristy stores many of the things you see on display in the church and it is where the priest and servers prepare for the Sunday and Wednesday communion services. This involves the following main items:


- Candles for the nave and high altars which have to be filled with oil before each service
- The ornamental plates that are displayed on the high altar and used for the collection
- The thurible together with supplies of charcoal and incense which has to be lit before each service
- The processional cross
- The gong and sounder which is rung during the consecration of the bread and wine
- Altar cloths and dust covers which Rosemary often has to wash following a priestly spillage
- Altar frontals for the high altar and lady chapel which are changed depending on the colour required for the particular service or season
- The priests' vestments which change during the year to match the altar frontals

Finally there are the various items that are required for the communion service:

- The brass and silverware kept in the safe
- Priests and people's wafers and the communion wine which is actually port which does not go off as quick as wine.
- The various small white linen cloths used for the communion which again need to be washed regularly by Rosemary
- The cruets for water and wine and a small bowl to enable the priest to ceremonially wash his hands prior to the consecration

There are ancient names for the various parts of the communion set up which are shown in this illustration which we use to prepare in advance of the service

I hope this removes some of the mystery of the smallest room, if any one would like to get more involved with service preparation or as a server you would be very welcome.

After over three years without having weekly practices, we restarted on the Wednesday before the Coronation, when as well as our regular team of seven, we welcomed four keen beginners.


On Coronation Day we rang for an hour from 9 am. As well as our regular team, we included five visiting ringers, including two from Somerset and County Down.




## Book Club

There was a mixed reception to The Long Road from Kandahar, several people thought the story was too 'neat and tidy' and thought more could have been made of the relationship between mother in law and daughter in law and the similarities of their experience that were only hinted at. As always, though, it was good to read of places in Cornwall that we could all relate too.

Further discussion about our next book means we have dropped Hungry Ghosts for the time being as most people wanted something different., so after throwing a few ideas around we settled on a collection of 11 short stories. They are all set in modern day Israel written by Omer Friedlander. The title story, The Man Who Sold Air in the Holy Land is about a con man who tries to sell empty bottles of 'holy' air to tourists. A school show and tell is about the kidnap of a holocaust survivor whilst another shares the story of a volunteer at a West Bank checkpoint of a mother mourning her son killed in Gaza.



We are given descriptions of the lush orange groves in Jaffa, the Negev desert and the narrow alley ways of Jerusalem and of

course some insight into the Arab/Israeli conflict. The stories have been described as 'fairy tales turned on their head by the stakes of real life'.

### Some Extracts from Cornísh Newspapers

### by Michael Tangye

The files of Cornish newspapers have for long been transcribed by this writer to be used in writing numerous articles. Occasionally one finds references to local churches and chapels which are of interest.

<u>West Briton June 22nd 1876</u> 'NEW BAPTISH CHURCH, on what was once tin steam works. In obtaining a foundation many feet of gravel had to be removed and old mine workings laid bare, all of which created great interest. An arch and buttress have been built over the town leats which runs under the centre of the Chapel, and a deep adit under the wall of the north corner of the building (These two streams were (1) from the country, (2) an adit (drain) from three mines)'

<u>West Briton July 13th 1876</u> Baptist Chapel Foundation stone laid by Mr T Haynes of Plymouth. Two hundred folk attended a luncheon at the United Methodist Free Church (Note: 'Flower Pot' Chapel in Fore Street). Cost will be £1,500 with 500 seats. It was originally intended to build it on the old chapel site where the last service was held on May 2, 1875 but now held in the Druids Hall. (Note: now St Ruman's garden)

<u>West Briton March 28th 1878</u> 'PARISH CHURCH to be re-seated The long gallery at the West End to be removed and the handsome arch between the tower and the church, now blocked up and quite hidden from view, should be opened. The old pulpit removed and the pulpit and reading desk placed at the East end (Note: In April the sale of the pulpit, reading desk, gallery and pews, communion rails, vestry etc were sold for £28 and £29. In July the church re-opened. The two East doors were closed to make way for a new pulpit).

<u>West Briton July 14th 1881</u> 'ROMAN CATHOLIC FUNERAL, the first at Redruth. Irishman James Barry, who kept lodgings for travellers at East End. A 'wake' was held on Friday. He was buried in the cemetery at East End by Father Crontelle—'The service was long—but a very nice one'.

<u>West Briton July 29th 1881</u> 'Some friends at Redruth arrange for the erection of a Mission Hall 70 feet square at the East End of the town on Pednandrea Mine Sett for the Salvation Army'

<u>West Briton June 19th 1882</u> 'The Town Mission Hall (Note: at Plain-an-Gwarry) with the town Missionary, work for the poor, but are now joined by the Salvation Army. Mr R S Edwards, chemist being instrumental in this, General Booth arrived on the 2.27pm up train from Penzance, the stringed and brass Salvation Army Band paraded through Alma Place, up Fore Street and Shute Row to the site where flags were flown. The foundation stone was hung up by a pulley but was lowered for safety when the crowd pressed forward, breaking the boarding—to the cry of 'Halleluiah!' from the General. He later gave an address in the Free Methodist Chapel before an evening procession around the town with the waving of umbrellas and sticks. Another service followed, packed with 3,000 people!

<u>West Briton August 2nd 1883</u> St Andrew's foundation stone laid by Mrs Bassett of Tehidy and Lord Clinton on July 26th. The church will hold 380 people (Note: this before being enlarged). Sunday School 400—cost about £5,000. the large excavation for the crypt remains open, though walled and fenced off.

**Royal Cornwall Gazette June 8th 1877** Rector and Parish church criticised. 'The Parish have to raise £1,600 per annum through an obnoxious tax for an aged rector, who until the last eight or ten weeks, has been non-resident for years. We have for all this money, only one badly constructed church, and one small miserably attended Chapel of Ease—that the regular church-going people, unless they belong to a particular faction, only get a visit from their spiritual pastors on average once a year' (Note: 'absentee clergy' were for long a problem in Cornwall)

### My way to Compostella Day 4 Len Cunníngham

Shared rooms who would have them? Certainly not for a restful night! We had a French Priest sharing with us who was snoring for the kingdom of heaven, if we managed 3 hours of restful sleep it was more by luck than his lack of snoring, added to this was my frantic attempt to extract myself from my sleeping bag to go to the toilet. Having an all-season micro bag seemed a good idea, but a zip that goes all the way from feet to neck can be tricky to get undone in a hurry and to add insult to injury, to find no toilet paper available meant a trip back to the room to get my reserve emergency supply. A tip to all fellow walkers, "pilgrims devour toilet paper, even to the extent of nicking it on their way out" so come supplied, failing that look out for some decent dock leaves!

So, at around 5am we were having a coffee from a roadside vending machine before hitting the trail. The one consolation going through my mind, in addition to what I could have done to the priest, was that we would be in Pamplona in very good time, thereby having the opportunity to see something of this famous city. For the next 11.2Km the walking was pleasant, undemanding and warm. Crisscrossing the Rio Arga, we reached the medieval bridge which crosses the Rio Ulzanna

Here begins the outskirts of Pamplona and the 4.6Km trek into the city, dodging the traffic and keeping an eye out for yellow arrow markers on the road, lampposts or any other conceivable position.

The final approach to the walled city was across a wide green plaza to follow the city walls and enter by the drawbridge and the splendid Portal de Zumalacàrregi also known as the Portal de Francia, a reminder that Pamplona has always welcomed pilgrims from all over the world including France, despite Roland's destruction of the city. Having passed into the city we found a very pleasant and recently opened Albergue. It had individual beds in pods, very good showers and more importantly washing and drying machines. The Albergue had a number of pilgrims already there when we arrived, one a young Irish man. We came across him sitting in his pod struggling with blisters on both feet. I offered to help him with his first aid and in return he treated Andrew and I to some delicious tapas for lunch. We later, together visited Iruna the Art Deco café frequently visited by Hemingway when staying in Pamplona for the Running of the Bulls which he wrote about in his book the "The Sun Also Rises", much too expensive to stay for coffee. Later in the evening, as Andrew and I sat outside a bar on the corner of the main Square Plaza del Castillo next to the La Perla a 5-star hotel, we saw, and were joined by the two Australian ladies we first met at supper in Roncesvalles, those of the sleeping bags/hair dryer discussion. They were delighted to tell us that they were staying in the adjacent hotel and had wi-fi in the bathroom! I can't say with any confidence if they finished their pilgrimage, but we never saw them again! Having not been invited back to the hotel for dinner with them, we returned to the Albergue after a nice Italian dinner for a hopefully good night's rest before tomorrow's 27km.


