

# Complete

Last night, I had the privilege of sharing a reflection on my ministry here in Redruth at the Deanery Synod. The rural dean believed it would be interesting to discuss the ministry involving my motorbike and the work God has been doing through it. While some might see the motorbike as a midlife crisis (hehe), for me, it symbolizes stepping into, joining, God's story. It represents His intimate knowledge of us, His blessings upon us, and our journey toward being made whole in Him.

The story starts back in the 1980's where I grew up admiring the likes of James Dean, Marlon Brando, Paul Newman, Steve McQueen and Tom Cruise, all of which rode motorbikes. They were the epitome of cool and represented excitement, adventure and freedom, a real freedom that I longed for, and I grew up always wanting a motorbike. It wouldn't be until my 40's and in priest training where God would bless me with the ability to get a bike and enjoy a new found freedom and peace that you only get from being on the road and being with and in a relationship with Him.

What you may ask has this anything to do with us and possibly our faith journey. Well, what I have learnt from this journey is that God delights in us. If we delight in him, he will give us the desires of our heart (Psalm 37:4). Not everything, but desires that will reflect him, that join in His journey. And this gift, God giving us the desires of our heart, what is it for? We are told in John 15:11, 'I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete'. He delights in us, in us being happy, he wants His joy to be in us and our joy made complete. We are complete in Him, and he makes us complete in joy. Is that not beautiful to know?

One of the most beautiful things about this gift, the bike, is that it has connected me with people, taken me to places, where I have been able to come alongside people, hear their stories, be a Christian presence where there was none before, for we are told in Colossians 4:5-6, 'Be wise in the way you act toward outsiders; make the most of every opportunity. Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how to answer everyone.' We are to pioneer, to go out, be, where others are not.

May you delight in the Lord today. May He know the desires of your heart, and may you find your Harley Davidson, the thing that completes your joy, so you may share that joy with others this day. Through your joy, may they come to know God's joy in their lives and be complete in Him. Amen.

## **ST ANDREW REDRUTH**

### A Saturday to remember

My early pre school memories are mostly filled with images of hot, sunny days where the sky was a cloudless sea of blue and the days were filled with joy and fun. There was however, one particular Saturday that wasn't quite so perfect.

We had recently acquired a budgerigar. It had appeared, as pets often did, like magic. My Father would come home from work with stories about 'unloved, unwanted or about to be put down' pets and then from no where he would produce a box. In this particular box was a budgerigar!

After my Mother had recovered sufficiently from the shock of yet something else sharing our home, we made our way to the Pet Shop which was opposite Sam Lean's pub. This shop was definitely my most favourite place in the whole wide world. I loved everything about it. The smell of wood shavings, hay and seeds, the noise of the birds in their tiny cages, the baby rabbits, all fluff and big eyes and the gold fish. This small shop was paradise to a little animal lover like myself. Here my Mother bought all that was needed to house our new, little friend. 'Joey' was quite a handsome chap, blue like the summer sky and he would sing and chatter away all day long. In the evenings my Father would let him fly free in the living room while my Mother would pretend to disapprove.

We had only had him a short time when one Saturday morning he was found stone dead on the bottom of his cage. Everyone was so upset and after discussing what could have caused this, we buried him at the end of the garden, near the old Air Raid Shelter.

Later that afternoon, tummies full of pasty, my brother and I set up his wicket and stumps to play cricket. The Sullivan boys, Paul and Jerome appeared and I was then relegated to watching, not old enough to play with the big boys! The game was nearly over when my brother, batting, smacked the ball so hard it left the garden and went straight through the next door neighbour's garage window.

I remember now, so clearly, how we all sat at the kitchen table discussing what had happened while we waited for our neighbours to return. It was decided my brother, who was only 9, would go to see our neighbours, explain what had happened and offer to pay for the damage. As it transpired the lovely Mr and Mrs Peters were very understanding. It was agreed that their son would repair the window while we would pay for the glass.

I remember my Mother saying how proud she was of my brother for having the courage to face Mr and Mrs Peters like a grown up. I'm afraid all I could think about was what kind of a pet my father might bring home next? Perhaps a parrot, or maybe a squirrel. Even better, a little, white fluffy, baby seal! My imagination knew no bounds.

The Celtic Quiet Places scheme continues and more passports are on the way. Three new churches have joined, which are: St Just in Penwith, TR19 7EZ; Holy Name, Boyton, PL15 9RJ; St Denys North Tamerton. EX22 6RY. These ensure coverage from the far west of Cornwall to one of the most easterly parishes, St Denys, North Tamerton, a 15<sup>th</sup> century church which is the only parish that stretches both east and west of the Tamar. If you are new to this, the scheme is open to all churches in the Diocese to stay open as a place of refuge and reflection. Each church in the scheme is listed on the website and in the 'passport' with details of opening times and facilities. You can buy a passport for £2 in any of the churches and there will be stamps in each place you visit to help complete the passport record. It is a great way to see Cornwall and become familiar with our fantastic church heritage, so please do let visitors or anyone who might be interested know about this.

# BOOK CLUB

The Purple Hibiscus by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie turned out to be a good read but very hard in places, challenging everyone to remember that we don't know what goes on behind closed doors. The public face of Dad, a respected elder at church and in the community, was not the same face that his family experienced. We had a vibrant discussion about many issues that were raised in the pages of this novel – well worth reading and you can pick up a copy at St Andrew Redruth from the bookcase housing copies of many of our books. You'll find it near the coffee area.

The Novel in the Viola by Natasha Solomons is our next book

In the Spring of 1938 Elise Landau, the cosseted and beloved 'baby' of an haute bourgeois Jewish family is forced from her home in Vienna by the rise of Nazism. Domestic servitude is a bit of a comedown but a welcome escape from the persecution to which her compatriots are being subjected. She gains her position in Tyneford House n part on the strength of a misworded advert [I will cook your goose]. Elise makes an unlikely parlour maid but she does alright and it's not long before the young master gives her English lessons. In the meantime his father is interceding with the German authorities on her parents behalf.

**Still Life** is a debut novel by Louise Penny, first in a series of mystery novels featuring Chief Inspector Armand Gamache and set in Quebec. The book centres on the death of a beloved former teacher in Three Pines, a quaint village outside of Montreal. Gamache and his team soon realise that what appears to be an accidental death is murder ...

# Staying well this summer

It's important to look after yourself as temperature's start to rise. Here are some top tips for staying well in the heat.

**Stay Hydrated**: Make sure to drink plenty of water to prevent dehydration. Avoid alcohol and caffeine, as they can contribute to dehydration.

**Seek Shade**: Stay in the shade, especially between 11 am and 3 pm when the sun is strongest. Wear a hat and light coloured clothing to keep your body cool.

**Cool Down**: Take cool showers or apply cool water to your skin or clothes. Cold food and drinks can also help lower your body temperature.

**Keep Your Living Space Cool**: Close windows during the day to keep the heat out and open them at night when it's cooler.

Remember, hot weather can affect anyone, but older adults, those with certain medical conditions, and people on multiple medications are more susceptible to the heat. Becoming too hot can lead to heat exhaustion and heat stroke.

The signs of heat exhaustion include:

- tiredness
- dizziness
- headache
- feeling sick or being sick
- excessive sweating and skin becoming pale and clammy or getting a heat rash, but change in skin colour can be harder to see on brown and black skin.
- cramps in the arms, legs and stomach
- fast breathing or heartbeat
- a high temperature
- being very thirsty
- weakness

Heat exhaustion isn't a medical emergency if the person is cooled down in 30mins. After this time, it becomes heat stroke which is a medical emergency and requires medical attention. If someone has heat exhaustion, follow these 4 steps to cool them down:

- 1. Move them to a cool place.
- 2. Remove all unnecessary clothing like a jacket or socks.
- 3. Get them to drink a sports or rehydration drink, or cool water.
- Cool their skin spray or sponge them with cool water and fan them. Cold packs, wrapped in a cloth and put under the armpits or on the neck are good too.
  Stay with them until they're better and if they don't improve after 30mins seek medical attention.

# My Way to Compostela — Day 11

## Azofra to Redecilla 26.3Km

After a light breakfast of coffee and croissant priced by the Albergue at 3 euros each, we were back on the trail by 8am with the likely hood of a very wet day ahead of us. As we were no longer sticking to the guidebook stops, we had no fixed plan, it would be weather dependent as to where and when we stopped. Then leave the Alburgue following the designated route, there is a alternative route that would have added at least half a days walk, but in this rain was out of the question. So we made our way out of the village climbing up through what would have been lovely scenery if not for the rain heading towards the small town of Ciruena. We pass a medical pilgrim maker as we head up to cross an irrigation channel 'Canal de la Margen' which we cross over to continue on farm tracks, which by now in the heavy rain have become clogged with the heavy red Rioja earth which clings to our boots and makes the walking harder work. As we approach Cirueña we are now on a hard stone track which takes us pass the Rioja Alta Golf Club and through an abandoned 'Area de Descanso' new suburbs half finished and empty with the 'Sevende' for sale signs dotted all over them. From here the route takes us out of the forgotten suburbs past a roundabout before turning left onto more sticky clogged farm tracks, that undulated over the surrounding fields to the outskirts of Santos Domingo de la Calzada. The town of Santo Domingo has a population of around 6000 and it will come as no surprise to you all, that it has a long and ancient history with the Camino going back to the 11<sup>th</sup> century. Legend has it that it owed its place on the Camino to Sant Dominic of the Road. Born to a peasant family around 1019, he was denied entry to the local monastery. Thereafter he spent his life improving the route and facilities for pilgrims passing through Santo Domingo, including building a pilgrim hospital and a church now the towns Cathedral. The Cathedral has a chicken coop, in which are kept a cock and hen. They are kept there as evidence of one of the Way of St James Miracle's.

"The story goes that a pilgrim couple with this son was passing through the town and stopped at one of the Inns. The Inn keepers daughter fell for the young man but as a devout lad he rejected her advances. Angered by his refusal (Hell has no fury like a !!!!!!!!!) she hid a silver goblet in his pack and accused him of stealing it. He was arrested and sentenced to hang, he was hanging from the gibbet before his parents discover what had taken place and they found him still hanging but miraculously still alive thanks to the intervention of Santo Domingo. The parents then rushed to the town's Sheriff and found him about to eat his supper. He refused to believe them that their son was still alive and stated that their son was no more alive that this chicken he as about to eat, at that moment the chicken stood up and began to crow, whereupon the Sheriff rush out and cut the lad down and granted him a full pardon" As we sat in the Protocol of the church to eat our lunch I was glad to be having a Jamon sandwich.

Sunday afternoon tea time was always a very special family event. We would either have our Grandparents in for tea or we would visit them. As children, we always enjoyed this as we were given so much attention and even collected a bit of pocket money. Not being very happy at leaving them, it was home to change again into our 'Sunday best'.

I did not always go to Evensong in my Church but would travel with my Father who was possibly taking the service in another Church. This sometimes made me quite nervous because I was often asked to play a part in the service. The St Day old Church was one of my favourites. In spite of this, Evensong, both sung or said, is still one of my favourite services.

While at times complaining at the Sunday discipline, it strangely now gives me so much pleasure being able to laugh and reminisce at how my Sundays had and still have an affect on my life.

I expect many of us will have memories of how our Sundays were spent and how our lives evolved around the Church community. Perhaps we could have a memory page on the Church Community i.e. Tea Treats, Choir Trips, Scouts and Guides, Youth Club, Mothers Union etc. Some of the memories are now being repeated but under another name i.e. Church Players are now called Randoms. I would be willing to collect them.

Sundays are a special day, wherever you may be In a Church, eating roast dinner or with the family just for tea. Habits have changed as the years have gone along But the bond that Sundays give us will always keep us strong. Be happy on your Sunday, being thankful what comes your way Thanking our Lord for all his blessings and for giving us this day.
