## **Rector's Notes - MARCH 2020**

### The same, but also different

I'm still enjoying my early morning half-hour runs round the town — it gives me a strange sort of energy for the day! Just this week it's been noticeably not quite so dark when I begin, and best of all I've been hearing the most beautiful sound of an early-to-rise blackbird singing at the end of my road.



Spring follows winter; it's one of life's certainties. But nonetheless, to see proof that something better is on the way gives us a great boost - change is on its way! Of course at one level the changes are ones we witness every year, but usually something about them strikes us in a fresh way too.

The church year also has some big changes coming up, though much like the seasons of the year, these changes we are used to living through each year. Lent is now upon us — a time for reflection and penitence, as we prepare for the intensity of remembering Christ's passion during Holy Week, and the glory of Easter once more. Lent is a time for growth too, and elsewhere you'll find details of the four different Lent groups happening in our benefice, designed to move us on in our faith, and increase our understanding.

Something new for this Lent is more evidence of Readers-in-training. Our own Jason Hoole-Jackson is preaching his first assessed sermon which forms part of his first year formal training. And from the nearby parish of Stithians, Jane le Page is joining us for most of Lent on placement. She's in her second year of training, and is coming to us for a wider experience of church life in a different context to her own.

Both Jason and Jane are super examples of God calling people to new vocations. This Lent would be a good time for all of us to offer ourselves afresh to God in case he might be calling us to a different sort of ministry. Certainly it's a good time for us to continue to pray for God to raise up new leaders of all sorts to carry on with and develop new ministries in the life of our churches. The initiative Growing Your Church is throwing up all sorts of good ideas of ways we can encourage the growth of our churches in numbers, in spiritual depth and in service to our communities, but always these new initiatives need people to make them happen. Yet God is not poor — so let us continue to pray for God to provide us with all that we need, to enable us to do the things he wants us to do — whether that is more of the same, or different new things!

#### ST ANDREW REDRUTH

As usual the evening consisted of a heady mix of singing, snacks and storytelling as well as a well stocked bar. Audience participation was actively encouraged and it was an evening of fun, dancing and laughter.

The Informal communion service this month was led by Graham but featured Redruth's own Reader in Training, Jason Hoole-Jackson preaching his first formal Sunday sermon on "Salt of the Earth." We will look forward to more from Jason as his training progresses and to his initial licensing in October 2021!

As that Sunday was also stewardship Sunday our hardworking treasurer, Richard Robinson had a slot to speak about the cost of running the church, the size of collections and the value of our fundraising activities. Although we had to dip into our shrinking reserves this year we were still able to give a sizable percentage to various causes and support others. The presentation really brought home the need to give through a standing order, or better still through the new Parish Giving scheme which is much more reliable than money in the service collection although this is still much valued.

The Tiddler Toddler group at St Andrews continues to go from strength to strength and thanks to a grant and donations we have been able to order some brand new folding tables that are the right height for our little users. #### **CORONAVIRUS**

In relation to the Coronavirus issue, and having received advice from the Diocese, here are some changes in the way we prepare for and administer holy communion. This is subject to review, and any updates will be given in church services as necessary:

- 1. Parishioners with coughs and sneezes are asked to refrain from shaking hands in the Peace. We suggest such people greet others with 'Peace be with you' and a cheery smile while staying in the pew, with their own hands clasped together.
- 2. After the ablutions at the altar, priests will sanitise their hands with alcohol-based sanitiser, as will those assisting before the distribution.
- 3. Intinction (dipping the wafer in the wine) is to be avoided, as it represents a disease transmission route.
- 4. The common cup will continue to be used until we receive advice to the contrary.
- 5. Before communion begins, those with coughs and sneezes will be asked to receive in one kind only (ie just the wafer).

## Millions of Christians all over the world will be marking the start of an important period of time on 26 February 2020 - the festival of Lent.

That is because it is Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of Lent in Western Christian churches.

During Lent, many people decide to give something up that they love - perhaps chocolate or biscuits. Others might decide to take *up* something, like helping out more at home or making an effort to be nicer to their brother or sister

#### What is Lent?

Lent is a period of 40 days during which Christians remember the events leading up to and including the death of Jesus Christ, who Christians believe is the Son of God and whose life and teachings are the foundation of Christianity.

The 40-day period is called Lent after an old English word meaning 'lengthen'. This is because of the time of year when it happens, as this is when the days start to get longer, as we approach summer.

It is a time of reflection and of asking for forgiveness, and when Christians prepare to celebrate Jesus's resurrection at the feast of Easter, which comes at the very end of Lent.

On Ash Wednesday, churches hold special services, at which worshippers are marked with ash. This is a symbol of death and remembering bad things that we have done, and is where the day gets its name from.

Typically, the ash is made from burning special crosses made out of palm wood, which were used in church services on the previous year's Palm Sunday. It is sometimes mixed with special oil.

### Why do people give things up until Easter Sunday?

Millions of people do this during Lent as a sign of sacrifice and to test their self-discipline. Christians believe that this is to represent Jesus Christ's sacrifice when he went into the desert to pray and fast for the 40 days before later dying on the cross.

In the Bible's New Testament, while Jesus was there, Satan tempted him to turn away from God and worship him instead, but Jesus refused to, which is why people might give something up, in order to test their own self-discipline too.

A small number of Christians may even fast for the whole of Lent. But more will only observe this practice on Ash Wednesday or Good Friday (the day at the end of Lent which marks Jesus's crucifixion, which is a day of mourning).

Lent ends with Holy Week, which leads to Easter Sunday - the most important day in the Christian calendar. This day marks the resurrection of Jesus after his death on the cross, and is a celebration of his life.

During Lent, the colour purple may be used in a lot of churches. This is because it is associated with mourning, ahead of Christ's death.

It is also used because it is the colour of royalty - and the end of Lent celebrates Jesus's resurrection and power.






## BOOK CLUB—FRIDAY 06 MARCH THE SIXTEEN TREES OF THE SOMME by Larrs Mytting

## WESTERN FILMS AND THE CORNISH

Before the advent of television in Cornwall the cinema reigned supreme, providing a welcome retreat from the worries of WW2 and taking us into a world of colour, interest and humour. At that time, we had two cinemas at Redruth—the present Regal and the Gem in Penryn Street, now the site of St Rumon's garden. Each showed twice weekly programmes with main and supporting films, trailers for those forthcoming and cartoons featuring Mickey Mouse, Donald Duck, Popeye and animals. Black and white dominated the screen with colour taking second place.

A visit to the cinema was always termed as 'going to the pictures'. Both buildings were crowded on a Saturday evening, with long queues at the Regal extending from the foyer up Fore Street. Those at the Gem extended at the Penryn Street entrance up winding steps to the pay desk, where it met steps ascending from the rear entrance in Cross Street. We were shown to our seats by uniformed ladies bearing torches, at each cinema.

At the Regal all was overseen by a uniformed commissionaire stationed in the foyer — his job being to announce to the large crowd, in a loud booming voice, the availability of vacated seats — 'one at a shilling', 'this at one and nine pence'.

The favourite film of most boys was a cowboy 'Western', depicting such masculinity as fighting and shooting, always heralded at school by 'Western down Regal'. Any appearance of a female on the screen into this tough male world was always greeted with loud audible groans by the boys, while triumphs by the male heroes brought forth cheers and clapping.

The research of Cornish Victorian newspapers show almost weekly reports of the exploits of Cornishmen and women living in the pioneer mining camps of the Wild West of America. Many of these rough towns are regularly featured in films. Amongst the Cornish were mine captains who were also local Methodist preachers noted for their oratory from the pulpit which often marked them as someone who could represent their community. We read of some who became prominent figures in politics, law and some as Sheriffs. The legendary Richard Bullock, 'Dashwood Dick' of Goss Moor hardly one of such who rode shotgun on the Deadwood Stagecoach on the Black Hills of Dakota in the 1870's, was only one of so many Cornishmen who made their mark in the American Wild West.

Another far less known was John Jenkins of Gwennap and well known as 'Uncle John' throughout the Cornish dominated community of Grass Valley in California where he died in 1888. He had first emigrated as a young man to South America, where he was gold mining, before settling with his family in the well known Cornish settlement of Mineral Point, Wisconsin where he mined for lead.

After mining for seventy years in all, his obituary recorded "He was a man who had faced bullets and pestilence where others have fled—a man who knew no fear". In the 1850's, with a Sheriff's posse he corralled three horse thieves at a point in Bear River, not far from Grass Valley. The cornered desperadoes opened fire on the posse, every member of which, save Jenkins, hastily sought shelter—but Jenkins stood his ground and killed one of the thieves and the others were captured. In 1849, he was one of the few who remained in the town and nursed the cholera stricken patients and gave Christian burials to the dead.

We see many similarities in Western films today which remind us of our own Cornish forbears who helped, in their ways, to shape the history of America.

### <<Talkabout>> Padstow to Harlyn Bay - © by Tricia Rowe

We left home at 8am on a lovely sunny day, heading for Harlyn Bay where we planned to catch the 9.15am bus to Padstow to begin our coastal walk.

Dave had spent the previous evening pouring over the coastal path map and a monster time table which includes buses, ferries and air flights. This time table had become his bedtime reading! St. Merryn was a bustling little village as we passed through with shops just opening up and people chatting on street corners, and then we were in Harlyn Bay. The beach was empty except for some dog walkers and five young men alighting from a car loaded with surf boards, obviously chasing the waves as one said: "Do they rate the beach here?"

We caught the bus into Padstow, the driver swooping along the country lanes, alighting by the old station platform the terminal of The Atlantic Coast Express in the days of steam. We could see the sand dunes of Rock on the other side of the River Camel, where we played as children, jumping off the dunes and shouting "Geronimo!"

A very flat, civilised path leads out of Padstow beside the River Camel passing the War Memorial, St. George's Cove, Gun Point where a notice informed us there had been a battery there for 400 years, the expanse of Harbour Cove, known locally as Tregirls, Hawker's Cove and the notorious Doom Bar where, according to our guide book, over 300 ships have foundered. All was quiet here except for the buzz of bees and flies, the tramp of our boots on the footpath and the tap of our walking poles. Pentire Point on the opposite side of Polzeath Bay was looking quite peaceful quite different to when we were over there with a raging wind tearing at our clothes a few days before. The Daymark on Stepper Point had an 'unsafe building' notice attached to it and barbed wire all around it. More people around here and we could now see Trevose Head clearly.

Everyone on the coastal path says 'hello', from the youngest to the oldest....the camaraderie of the great outdoors! Pepper Hole and Butter Hole are collapsed sea caves along this stretch of the coast, and entering Trevone is the spectacular Round Hole, another collapsed sea cave with the sea far below. We passed a couple of walkers in flip flops both carrying sizable back packs. By their flip flops I'd say they hadn't come far but by their back packs it looked as if they had been travelling for weeks! Ever onwards and westwards we walk the cliff tops to Harlyn Bay. Rounding every headland is an adventure and this adventure of ours will last for 600 miles, until we get to Poole in Dorset and the end of The Southwest Way!






