#### A new team member!



I'm very pleased to report that we have been able to recruit a new team vicar for mission in record time.



Revd Deborah Grigg, known as Deb, is someone I trained with and know very well. Her background is in teaching modern foreign languages, and she has a very broad range of church experience, though she has a particular passion for and skill at connecting the Church with local schools, and a lot of experience at setting up Messy Church and Open the Book groups — ask her about them if you're not sure what they are!

#### Deb writes:

I'm glad to have this opportunity to introduce myself and say how delighted I am to have been invited to join the Team in Redruth as your Team Vicar for Mission. I am local to Camborne Redruth and have worked, worshipped and lived here for most of my life, but though I have attended various services in Treleigh, St Euny and St Andrews over the years, I have not been a regular worshipper in any of the Team churches. Some of you may know that I have been working with the churches in Camborne for the past few years and though I will be sorry to leave so many friends behind, at this point in my ministry, I feel very drawn to Redruth at what seems to be an exciting time of promise and opportunity for the Diocese, the Deanery and the Team. I am looking forward to spending time with as many of you as possible in the first few weeks, getting to know you and renewing acquaintance with some!

Deb's licensing service is at **3.30pm on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> March at St Andrew's**, Redruth, followed by tea in the Crypt. Bishop Philip will be taking the service. Do please come and join in this important celebration of Deb's new ministry among us. After that Deb is keen to spend some time visiting all the groups that already happen in our churches, and talking to lots of people about the things we'd like to see our churches more involved in.

### This month, Rev Graham meets Luci Isaacson

I'll start with a story, and a scene. It is nearly midnight. Picture a small Greek church in total darkness until a single candle is brought through the doors to the hushed anticipation of a packed congregation. It has arrived! A flame had been kindled at the church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem and devoted nuns had been given special permission by the authorities to carry it onto a plane bound for Athens. Arriving there, a candle was lit from that one flame and carried to the village church on the island of Hydra, some 40 miles away. From that single flame brought into the church white candles are lit, a wave of light growing outwards until the building is aglow. Then the fireworks start outside, and people pour onto the streets, as a shout goes up, "Christos anesti!" "Christ is risen!" The people rejoice and cheer into the night, and the feast continues the next day. Everyone is part of the celebration, including a young woman from Truro, about 25, who happens to be in that crowd that night. Living and working in Greece, and celebrating Easter with Orthodox Christians, is a far cry from her Methodist upbringing, and although she will eventually return home, something of that night – and that fire – will stay with her.

Wind the clock forward a bit and that woman, Luci Isaacson, is now telling me about her journey and how her work as a climate change scientist is developing apace. Luci and her daughter Lydia have become regular faces at Christ Church Lanner, and although she gets all around the county and beyond in her role as Diocesan Environmental Officer, she has found a home with us here in the benefice too.

Our conversation quickly turns to the environment, and to the work of Climate Vision. Luci has a background in recycling and has felt God leading and providing ways for her work in this area to grow. On leaving her successful work driving Cornwall Council's recycling strategy, Luci wanted to grow some more. As it turns out, she was given a payout on the Friday for pretty much the exact amount of an Earth Systems Science degree course which was starting in Falmouth the following Monday. Luci now spends her time putting to good use her skills and experience in Climate Change Risk Management.

"The flood in Coverack will happen again, somewhere" Luci tells me as we look out of the tea room at the trees. In July 2017 a storm had gathered in the Atlantic and paved a way towards the South West coasts of Britain. At the last minute, the storm had turned 90 degrees and inland, away from its tracked destination of Plymouth. Had the most intense rainfall ever recorded in the UK made landfall in the city the consequences would have been devastating. But as it was, most of the rain fell out to sea with just the tail of the weather system whipping in to the high ground above the village idyll on the Lizard. The damage was immense. But events like the flood at Coverack are set to increase 500% over the course of the next few generations. "We have to get ready and we have to become more resilient. It's the Brownies and Cubs thing: "Be Prepared" says Luci. "We need to grow our capacity and resilience."

Resilience: that is a key word which undergirds Climate Vision's 10 personal pledges and the Green Church Kernow awards scheme. "We need to change our understanding, we need to see that this is personal."

"I've been doing this for three decades but it is the opportunities with the church that excite me the most. The church is the best part of my job," Luci tells me with a smile. We talk about the fifth Mark of Mission – the point that caring for creation is an integral part of what makes us Anglican. Our calling as Christians is to celebrate God by stewarding his creation. We are about celebrating creation but if we look at our current consumption we would need three planets to sustain our use of the Earth's resources.

I learn of the government's most recently anounced strategy, a 25-year plan to get young people using local natural spaces. Every gardening club or allotment will help and each has a knock-on effect; tackling loneliness, obesity, fostering social cohesion and generating awareness of the world around us.

I take another look at the yellow leaflet and start to think about my first steps towards the pledges. I'm starting to think the 10 pledges are a stroke of genius, and already thousands of actions have been changed as a result. Such is the solid grounding of the arguments Luci puts forward, but equally persuasive is her gentle, joyous insistence that this is possible: another future is possible and we can be a part of getting ready for it. There are some easier ones to start with which empower each person to think about their own commitments. But they start to get a bit more personal too; looking at how I could save energy at home will take a bit more effort, and it will be uncomfortable too at first, no doubt.

Luci acknowledges this herself, as she tells me how conflicted she is about the air miles her travel plans for later this year will rack up. She is so looking forward to visiting Greece again to rekindle the wonder of those "Christos anesti!" moments which captivated her all those years ago. And we may pray that the spreading glow of those Easter candles in that little church may be reflected on these shores too, by a growing movement across the whole church committed to care for God's creation.

He was made a Cornish Bard in 1963 for services to the Cornish Language, his Bardic name being Gwas Costentyn. His wife, Christina was made a bard in 1970, her Bardic name being Gwylan. John grew up in Plymouth and his working life was spent as an industrial chemist in Bristol, before moving to Chacewater on retirement. His funeral at Chacewater Church was taken by Canon Eddie Woon, Rev'd Caspar Bush and Rev'd Peter Fellows. The thoughts and prayers of everyone at St. Stephen's, Treleigh are with Christina and her family.

The thoughts and prayers of everyone at Treleigh go to Barbara Oliver and her family on the passing of her husband John. Barbara has been a member of Treleigh congregation for many years until circumstances dictated otherwise and still keeps up with the Treleigh news. Both she and John are well known in Redruth for their popular and long running book, music and stationery business.

The service on Sunday January 27th was taken by Rev'd Jo Mulliner assisted by Anne Youlton as Eucharist Minister. Readings and Intercessions were by Keith Naylor. This was Jo's last service at Treleigh before moving to St. Saviour's Church, Bridge of Allan, Stirling, Scotland as Rector, and it was a chance for the congregation to show their appreciation for her friendliness, enthusiasm and sparkle that she has shown us over the last sixteen months. She will be greatly missed. A big thank you Jo, from all of us.

### <<Talkabout>> Be Prepared © by Tricia Rowe

We live out of a suitcase when we are away, whether it be a few days or a fortnight. We do hang a few things up but on the whole we don't use the hotel drawers. Most of our friends and family move into the hotel wardrobes and drawers and make it home from home!

I don't see the point in spreading jumpers, t-shirts and underwear around a hotel room only to have to re-pack the lot a week or so later. This payed dividends at a Premier Inn recently when I set the alarm on my phone and then inadvertently turned the phone off, so no alarm set! Panic when we overslept until 8am and we had arranged to meet a relative in the foyer at 8.30!

However, because our cases were already mostly packed, having never been unpacked, we did it and were downstairs with three minutes to spare!!

On holiday in Jersey the hotel fire alarm went off early evening and luckily before we were all evacuated we were told that it was a false alarm as someone had been using a hair dryer close to the fire alarm.

However, that set me thinking....if the alarm went off in the middle of the night and we had to evacuate in a rush, there are things I wouldn't want to leave behind....mobile phone, specs, any jewellery and I also need to carry epipens in case of an allergic reaction. So all these items I put in my shoulder bag at bed time and if the need arises during the night I grab my bag and we are off.

Well, on another jaunt the need did arise! The alarm went off in the middle of the night and in no time flat Dave and I were outside our bedroom in our pyjamas, accompanied by, you've guessed, my shoulder bag! However, another false alarm, but if it had been the real thing I would have had my essentials on me and I would have been able to use my phone to put the family's mind at rest. Be prepared is my motto!

# 'Kítch' George—A Redruth Character by Michael Tangye

I first saw 'Kitch' or 'Kitchie' as he was known, in the late 1940's when on a cross-country run from Redruth Grammar School. With others we had left the normal route and descended the rough and steep hillside leading from the Old Portreath Road down to a tin caloner building on the valley floor; from this the tiled chambers of an arsenic flue ascended the hill slope. On passing these on our noisy descent, we were suddenly startled by a huge roar we had disturbed Kitch as he slumbered in his tile lined chamber home!

He was, at that time, a familiar figure in Redruth—tall, bearded and becapped, attired in a long overcoat. In his slow ascent of Fore Street, his eyes were kept firmly on the ground, pausing only to gather any discarded cigarette 'dog-end' which was thrust into his deep pockets to provide him, later, with a little pleasure. He could also be seen to fumble through any wastebin, probably in search of food, to supplement the buns and bread brought out to him by assistants in bakery shops.

At an early hour each morning, before such shops were open, he checked each door as he passed to ensure that they were secure. One morning the staff of Lloyds Bank arrived to find him sat in front of their entrance, and were immediately aware that it had not been locked the previous night, and that Kitch had been guarding it!

I had always wished him "good morning Kitch" when en-route to my occupation at Redruth Hospital, but his response was always only a grunt. It was during a severely cold winter in the 1960's that he was found ill, in his little tiled 'home' and was taken to the hospital seriously ill with pneumonia. It was there that I visited him during a lunch-break, unrecognisable having had his beard and hair closely shaved off.

He did not converse but merely grunted replies; a glance at his bedside chest revealed his true name, then unknown to the public—Alsace Lorraine Kitchener George, illustrating that his father had probably served in the First World War. It was also rumoured that Kitch had suffered mentally, from his experiences as a soldier in WW2.

Sadly he died in 1983. News spread quickly through Redruth that the respected figure of 'Kitch' would no longer be seen in its streets. The Rev Jim Hunkin, the Redruth Methodist Minister, organised a public collection so that a burial and a monumnent for his grave could be arranged. Nearly £200 was collected, in small amounts, with funeral fees reduced following a plea from the Rev J Hunkin. And so 'Kitch' was laid to rest in the Trewirgie cemetery, his gravestone facing the town whose inhabitants, in spite of his physical appearance and chosen way of life, had shown him great respect.

We have found a parallel in a recent burial service held for a person who had no relatives, which no doubt will be recorded in this current magazine; for those of us who attended it revived

memories of 'Kitch.






