Rector's notes - NOVEMBER 2022

Remembering and Remembrance

We are right into the season of Remembering and Remembrance in our churches. In case you wondered, we call it Remembering when we mark the death of our loved ones, especially those who have died in the last year or two. Whereas Remembrance is about the Poppy Appeal, and the Royal British Legion - Remembrance Sunday always being the second Sunday of November.

This year by popular demand we are holding Remembering services in each of our five churches, and also in Four Lanes Chapel – our Flapjack partners – the dates are below (apologies if you missed the St Andrew's one which happened on 16th October). The services coming up are:

Treleigh - Sun 30th Oct at 3pm; St Euny - Sun 6th Nov at 3pm; Christchurch - Sun 6th Nov at 6pm Pencoys - Sun 13th Nov at 6pm

Please do come if you want to remember someone you love but who has died and had a funeral somewhere other than this area. It's a chance to give thanks for their life, and to bring our grief to God, however we're feeling at the moment.

In addition to that, this could also be a chance to invite someone you know who doesn't usually come to church, but who is grieving for someone close to them. If you've never been to one of these services, we have a few well-known hymns, poems, a Bible reading, a short address, then the names of those we are remembering will be read out, and everyone will be invited to light a candle.

In addition to these services, at 7pm on Wednesday 2nd November at Treleigh we have our joint benefice All Souls service. This is described by the Church of England as 'the commemoration of the faithful departed' – for us that's most likely to be our parents and / or grandparents who may have died many years ago. Prayers for this service remind us that we're still connected with that great group of ordinary Christians who have finished their earthly life, and rest in peace, awaiting the final resurrection of everyone, which we believe will happen at the return of Jesus to be rightful King of the whole world.

May God bless us, and remind us of his goodness and care, in all the remembering we're doing in this season.

REFLECTIONS

Whilst pondering what to share this month the only thing that came to mind is something that is happening in my home town with one of my friends. Nigel has been a friend since I came to faith over 14 years ago. We worked together in our church's youth group, went on overseas mission together, and we were part of a close home group together. Nigel and his wife Ruth have been close dear friends for a long time and heavily influential and supportive in my faith walk. Three weeks ago we received the information that Nigel was suddenly taken into hospital where seven tumors had been found on the brain; shattering news for his wife and children and for all those that know him and love him. It is times like these that I realise how far I am from home and old friends, and how powerless I am in these situations.

Over the last few weeks I have been reflecting on what we can do in hard situations, situations where we may feel helpless and useless instead of being helpful and supporting. Where is our faith and our God in these moments? Why do these things happen? On a personal note, I have had some deep gut-wrenching prayers, real, deep calls out to God for help and in my humanity, for God to intervene. However, this isn't my first rodeo, I have seen God pull out miracles saving family members, and on other occasions, I have lost dear, close friends and quite a few. Which, in part, makes these situations harder as I know that He can, and does save some people, whereas others are called home. This is the mystery of faith.

When trying to come to terms with the situation, I am reminded of a couple of things. We have all been here, this is something that is not new and can be seen in our church family, our community, in scripture. The Psalms are full of gut-wrenching cries out to God, 'How long must I wrestle with my thoughts and day after day have sorrow in my heart? How long will my enemy triumph over me?'. They are filled with expressions of grief, lament, anger, and even doubt. Honesty, even to the point of anger: "How Long, Lord? Wilt Thou hide Thyself forever?" (Psalm 89). Pete Greig explores the difficulty of these types of situations in his book 'God on Mute' where he talks about coping in these situations, unanswered prayers, naked prayers and God being silent. Pete tells us that it is important that we learn to lament. Jesus Himself was overwhelmed with sorrow, wrestled and cried out to God, begged for another plan, and allowed His friends to see that this was how He felt.

Lamenting is more than a technique for venting emotion. It is one of the fruits of a deepening spiritual life that has learned to stand naked before God without shame or pretence. If I can do anything for my friend it is that I can lament, I can petition a God who listen's, who does perform miracles, who has already conquered death. Prayer; simple, honest, prayer is what is needed. This is how we fight our battles, this is our weapon of faith. There is a great contemporary worship song that says, 'it may look like I am surrounded, but I am surrounded by You'. All we have is our faith, and sometimes that is all we need.

May this bring solace to those who may have or be experiencing the same. You are not alone. We are in these moments together and with Christ. Amen.

THE ARCHBISHOP'S DFFERENCE COURSE

MANY THANKS to Ron. P. who, through his technical skill, enabled both Christchurch and FLAPJACK to engage fully with the five week course. The nineteen participants were totally absorbed by the films and the discussion that followed.

The course focused on three 'habits':

BE CURIOUS / listen to other people's stories, especially those with whom you have a difference

BE PRESENT / showing up, sticking around, learning to encounter others with authenticity RE-IMAGINE / finding hope and opportunity in the places where we long to see change

In the words of the Archbishop: DIFFERENCE is a course that explores how we can follow Jesus in a complex and divided world and trying to see and experience transformation through everyday encounters. This can be very hard, as we encounter differences in our relationships, in our communities and in our wider systems and structures. Many of us long to make a difference, but often don't know how to respond or where to start. The course hopes to enable you to cross divides, navigate disagreement and pursue a just and flourishing world.

Was it chance? The film that the Christchurch showed at the Film Club in October was "Hidden Figures". It was a film set in the 60s when the USA was in a battle with Russia to conqueror space. Three Afro-Caribbean women were computer experts, but their amazing knowledge was not valued or wanted. As the film progressed the overt racism they suffered was gradually overcome and the women saved a space expedition from disaster by correcting the re-entry co-ordinates. It was a true story please try and watch it sometime!!

On another note!! In this time of remembering those whom we love but see no longer, this quote may help you

"When someone you love becomes a memory; then memory becomes a treasure"

ST ANDREW REDRUTH

You might have seen the large and very accomplished pictures of fungi which are decorating the pillars of the arcades at St Andrew's this month. They are the work of pupils at Trewirgie School who have been attending assemblies in church and donating a large number of items for the food bank. This activity originated in 2016 when the September floods damaged some of their buildings and they were unable to fit the junior school into the hall, so asked whether they could use St Andrew's instead. Caspar was pleased to welcome them and that has continued to the present. The whole of the pupil cohort of the junior school (nearly 400) attended in the week of October 2nd and eighty year-two arrived on Wednesday 12th with more donations. This was a wonderful contribution from the school and is much welcomed by the Food Bank. Supplies at the Food Bank have been less reliable from the shops & other outlets in recent months, probably due to the increase in the cost of living, so this year's bumper harvest donations from the churches has filled the shelves and prepared them well for the coming cold weather and anticipated increase in demand.

The Advent and Christmas Season is rapidly approaching and St Andrew's is looking forward to the large number of concerts and events planned for November and December. These include the Christmas Market which will take place on Friday 25th & Saturday 26th November from 10.00am to 4.00pm, a big event at which we hope to welcome many people and sell a variety of beautiful gifts. All support is appreciated, please contact Lez if you can help and look out for further details in the weekly pew sheets. The Christmas Tree Festival will begin at St Andrew's and St Euny at this time, so please do spread the word.

The Randoms are active again for the winter and expecting to perform for our entertainment on the first weekend of December, on Friday evening 2nd December, look out for details of tickets and prices to be confirmed soon.

The stained glass window depicting St Euny placed in the north aisle of the church also shows St Francis, balancing the three-lights with the saints either side of the central figure of the virgin and child. St Francis has a special place in the church and this was celebrated with the pet service held on Sunday October 9th, the Sunday after the feast of St Francis which falls on October 4th. It has been several years since a pet service has been held in the church and the first which Rev. Caspar Bush has known, so it was with some uncertainty that we advertised the event. Giving Bear, a regular worshipper here and at St Andrew's, a central role in the promotion worked well in getting the message across. A pleasant and mild autumn afternoon augured well, and the first sign of something special was the sight of Sky being ridden down Church Lane by Bo with Anya guiding him. Sky, an elderly white pony, had travelled from the Roadway Fields where he lives, to church and was by some margin the largest of the animals who came to praise God and to be blessed. He was joined by around fifteen dogs of various sizes, a few cats and four newts. All were well behaved and their accompanying humans appeared to enjoy themselves, although the dogs were quite vocal and energetic during the second hymn. Many people stayed behind to enjoy a cup of tea and chat afterward, so we judge the event to have been successful and enjoyable for all who came. Look out for the next similar event, we are contemplating a follow-up.

After the cancellation of the Mining and Pasty Festival due to the death of our sovereign we decided to celebrate harvest with a pasty supper to use up the supply of frozen pasties purchased for the event. Our celebration of harvest at St Euny was at evensong on Sunday 2nd October and it was lovely to see members of the congregation who have been absent for so long due to the Covid epidemic returning to church.

The Christmas Tree Festival planning is well under way, a joint programme having been drawn up to enable people to enjoy the displays and events at both St Euny and St Andrew. St Euny will be open every Saturday from November 26th to December 17th from 12.00pm – 3.00pm, with special activities to accompany the tree displays. Wreath making and craft activities will be on offer on Dec 3rd and Dec 17th as well as some Christmas gift stalls. In addition the exhibition will be open on Wednesday afternoons 1.00pm to 4.00pm and on Thursday afternoons, 12-3.00pm. Music and refreshments will be available at church open times during this period and everyone is welcome to come along. Other Christmas events will be held and will be advertised in the weekly pew sheet and next month's Five Alive. If you feel able to help, please do get in touch with Linda or Lucie. A good number of people have already committed time, skills and resources, so thank you and we look forward to this opportunity to reach out to our community.

"A Postcard from Catalonia"

"Friday night - arrived at last to Barcelona airport where the thunderstorms had subsided and the warm air hit us as we descended the steps of the plane.

Welcoming hugs from my brother who has been residing in Spain for over 20 years, and his Catalonian wife. A 40 minute drive to their home in the town of St. Pere de Rebes, south of the city of Barcelona.

Saturday - Awoke to warm sunny weather and a leisurely breakfast. A trip to the seaside town of Villanova, where we walked around the interesting streets and then enjoyed an alfresco tapas meal at a seafront restaurant.

A walk along the soft golden sand with the sea lapping gently on the shore enticed me to have a paddle, definitely not Godrevey temperature!!

Photos taken of artistic work along the low cliffs, shells and colourful Mediterranean pieces of broken tiles embedded in the sandy cliff face and even a love poem which my brother interpreted for us.

Sunday - an early start for a 2 hour drive to the Costa Brava, stopping en route at a Medieval town to experience the winding steep cobbled streets lined with buildings 'as if straight out of the film set of El Cid'. A candle lit in the church where history tells us that the huge bell fell, hitting the priest and yet he survived with only a small injury.

Travelling on to a restaurant near the sea where a 3 course al fresco meal was very much enjoyed, followed by a coastal walk, not at all like the Cornish coast as many steps up and down, some through woodland and at other times cliff edge, thankfully with a barrier railing. Monday - a work day for my family and so we walked the 5km, mainly countryside walk, to Sitges, a walk we have enjoyed many times. Through dusty tracks lined with vineyards or olive groves and brightly painted houses. Normally visiting in March, we have really noticed the difference in the flora and fauna. Beautiful butterflies of yellow with lime-tipped wings and many others flitting around as if they were following us. The lizards and gecko shooting into the undergrowth as we pass. The Oleander bushes with their flowers ranging from white through various hues of pink and the bougainvillea so brilliantly coloured, magenta, crimson and scarlet, not to mention the aroma of the jasmine as we brushed past. The squabbling parakeets in the palm trees lining the long promenade.

A swim in the sea, so refreshing after our walk in 25 degrees and a picnic lunch with pigeons, not seagulls hoping for a crumb. A visit to a little cafe along one of the narrow streets before walking back to St. Pere de Ribes was very welcome.

EXCERPTS FROM A DAILY JOURNAL

My New Zealand Trip continued, by Michael Tangye

Nov 18th 'to Waitapu by small mini-coach collecting people from various places en-route. Passed a road called Trevelgue. Chatted with elderly lady passenger whose grandfather called Treleawarne had come from Cornwall to Otago in 1850. Again a geo-thermal area, reminiscent of the barrenness of the United Downs at St Day but with boiling springs and bubbling mud-holes, along with sulphur deposits.

Nov 19th 'Climbed to the Waitupu hot springs area. Pam and I borrowed a pair of shorts to bathe in the thermal waters. The highlight was the Lady Knox Geyser which erupts daily at 10.15am. A crowd had gathered whilst a guide poured soap powder into a hole at the top of the mound; it bubbled and frothed, ever more vigorously, before erupting, shooting a jet of water and steam high into the air.

Then on to Waimangu Valley, now densely wooded, parts once barren when Mt Taranera erupted in 1886. In the deep rift caused by the eruption is the largest thermal spring lake in the world, with a temperature of $47^{\circ}-65^{\circ}$ (The Maori guides there had a best friend John Trenwith!).

Nov 20th to Wellington by bus supreme scenery en-route passing the third largest manmade forest in the world, pine trees fronted by Scottish Broom. At Taipu is a huge lake 25 miles long—it lies in the crater of what is estimated as the world's largest eruption from a volcano. Then on through rolling heights, forever climbing until snow appeared and the land-scape was enveloped in smoke and blown ash which spattered on the exterior of the bus, all coming from the Mt Ruapehu which erupted last month, and is still simmering.

Then a long descent passing a vast gorge, rivers and endless plains. The road then passed along the shore-line, where waves broke angrily upon black rocks, before we arrived at Wellington—its harbour formed by an extinct volcano crater.

Nov 21st In the city we saw the 'Beehive', the New Zealand Parliament House, a round structure towering upwards in ever decreasing circles of glass and masonry. We journeyed above the city on a cable-car to the Botanic Gardens and an observatory with its large rose garden and exotic plants. Then a walk through the old settlers cemetery situated on a hillside where we noted the grave of 'William', son of (Mine) Captain Kestle of St Dennis Cornwall March 11 1890 aged 32 yrs. Erected by his father'. At the Anglican Cathedral of St Paul's, a new building with impressive stained glass windows and modern interpretation. Just a short distance away lies the old cathedral of wood, built in 1866, no larger then a parish church at home. (saw a large shop—'Pascoes').

<u>Nov 22</u> went for a walk through dense bush, a rain forest, to Butterfly Creek where a stream flows through the deep valley. A lovely environment with New Zealand Fern Trees, Cabbage Palms, Dracainas and other native trees, all alive with bird life.

Nov 23 To Eastbourne and to Pencarrow Point with its lighthouse on the site of the first navigational light to be erected in New Zealand in 1859. We had already passed a beach where 49 bodies were washed ashore in 1968, when a ferry sank in a terrific gale.






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
