

#### Rector's notes - OCTOBER 2021

Many thanks to those who joined us for the *On the Way* launch meeting with Bishop Hugh. If you're new to Five Alive or our churches then you can read more about this process by looking up this website:

At the time of writing we haven't yet finalised the two lay people who will be representing our benefice at the deanery meetings, but it has been agreed that November will be the month when we go to each church council and invite them to share what they believe is really important and life-giving about the life and service of their church family, and their hopes and dreams for the future. Because that discerning of a vision is absolutely the first part of this process, before we even start talking about the money, and we're very conscious that we need to give as wide a circle of people as possible the chance to share their dreams about what church could be.

One of the really positive exercises offered to help with this, you might like to have a go at yourself now:

Imagine that the year is 2030. A newspaper of your choosing has been doing in-depth research about the churches in this area, and wants to highlight the outcomes on the front page of their newspaper.

What is the very best front-page headline, and article, you can imagine them writing? I don't want to give you an example for fear of damping your imagination! But what would we actually love our churches to be best known for locally? Perhaps it's more of something that we already do, or perhaps it's something that's still only a dream at the moment.

The leadership team will begin to meet in October, and will be doing these sorts of exercises too, before we then start gleaning from the contributions from around the deanery. Please continue to pray that God would direct all of us in this process, and increase our faith and hope in him. If the whole idea of thinking about these things is a bit exhausting for you, please remember God never asks us to do what simply can't. Rather, he only asks us to trust in him, and do what we can.

#### THE TWO / SEVEN SACRAMENTS

Some people within the Anglican Church would argue that there are only two sacraments – those given by Jesus; BAPTISM and the EUCHARIST. Other people (like FP.) would say that there are seven sacraments – the two given by Jesus and CONFIRMATION, ORDINATION, ABSOLUTION, MARRIAGE and UNCTION (prayers for the sick and the dying).

A sacrament could be described as: an outward and visible sign of an inward and invisible grace. Think back to a moment when you have been present at a sacramental act; did it mean anything to you? Were you a participant or a witness. If a participant, were you changed? Was your faith strengthened? If a witness, were you aware that something was happening? That somehow God was drawing close to both participant and witness?

**BAPTISM** is about welcome, admission and inclusion. The one who has been baptised has become part of God's family; someone who has received the Holy Spirit and has formally begun their 'journey with Jesus'.

**CONFIRMATION** is about citizenship. A group from the Benefice of Redruth will be confirmed by a Bishop (it MUST be a Bishop) in October. They will remember their baptismal promises but now they will undertake to do what they can to further the work of God's church on earth.

**ORDINATION** gives a person the authority to administer five of the Sacraments. Only a Bishop may confirm or ordain. This is because as Jesus prepared to ascend into heaven he charged his first apostles to do all that they could to reveal God's love in the world. As a Bishop is 'the Christ amongst us' only a Bishop can give the authority for this work to be undertaken through the sacraments.

**THE EUCHARIST** enables a person to receive God's love through the bread and wine as a source of strength for the journey of faith and as a reminder of the events that led to the cross and the empty tomb. Once it was a sacrament reserved for those who had been confirmed, but now it is available to all.

**MARRIAGE** is a sacramental act that invites God to be part of a relationship. As Jesus himself went to a wedding and changed ordinary water into very special wine; so through this sacrament Jesus changes the lives of ordinary people into lives that proclaim God's love. At the present time, this sacrament is denied to same sex attracted people.

**ABSOLUTION/RECONCILIATION** takes from us the burdens that we all carry, those words, deeds and thoughts that separate us from God and sometimes from each other. As the waters of baptism remind us of the cleansing power of God's love, so absolution makes that power a reality and re-unites us with each other.

**UNCTION** may be used with the sick and the dying. Through the holy oils a person is anointed, absolved and prepared for the next stage of their journey. It is aways a moving and memorable sacrament as both participant and witness face the future together.

#### **ST EUNY**

Several people have returned to enjoy the re-opening of the church to its outreach and social events with a good attendance at Open Café on Wednesday afternoons. The serious squad are deeply engaged with their card games, but there is plenty of time for chat and refreshments for anyone who wishes to drop in to share some more relaxed time in good company. The faculty has now been approved for some much needed work to the bells, which will proceed soon. This will improve the safety of the bell mechanism. All church bells require sympathetic conservation and maintenance to ensure their continuation in use, but this must be carried out with careful consideration to ensure as little alteration as possible is made to the historic bells and bellframes. Fortunately there are still experts in practice who have the necessary skills and we will soon have this work undertaken. Then to the larger bell project ... of which more another time.

Harvest festival will be celebrated in St Euny at the Sunday Service on 3rd October. Before that we are planning a Harvest Supper, open to everyone in the Benefice, to be held in the church immediately after Evensong on Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> September. Details will be on the weekly sheet and we look forward to a healthy roast dinner, to raise funds to support the church. Work continues on the 'Sensory Garden' which has been laid out to the west of the tower. This project has grown and it is also in need of a faculty permission, so that application is underway. This will have to tie in with the work agreed to the outer boundary wall. The wall is thought to form part of the lan structure which is the oval embankment surrounding the church, probably dating to the 6<sup>th</sup> Century. This feature is widespread in Cornwall and is also found in Wales. It is therefore the oldest known Christian structure in Redruth. Unfortunately part of the boundary wall has collapsed and it is necessary to make this safe. Plans have been agreed for Cornwall Council to oversee the work as they now have responsibility for maintaining the graveyard area around the church. The Cornwall Archaeological unit will keep observations on any work that takes place and record any early finds. An iron fence will be placed in front of the gap and a supporting bank be placed on the west wall of the graveyard boundary.

In the light of the funding shortfall and the desire to ensure safety and environmentally aware practices, we have re-worked the letting agreement and fire policy. New policy documents will be posted in church and two snazzy high-vis jackets are available for use by 'fire wardens' in case of fire. The assembly point in this event will be outside the new graveyard, across the road from the church. We hope and pray that we will never have to use it!

Congratulations to Jason who has completed his training to be a Lay Reader and we wish him many blessings for his Licensing on 9<sup>th</sup> October.

## **Blackberry Season 1952**

Autumn has always been a herald of change. The long, hot summer days of my childhood that gently drifted towards September were no different. The morning light and warmth just came a little later but my days, prior to starting school, were still filled with wonder and innocent happiness.

Late August meant blackberries appearing in all their juicy, black glory, hiding their biggest jewels in the undergrowth, just out of reach from tiny hands. My Aunt Muriel would appear on our doorstep with a large, white milk jug in her hand. To me she always looked the same wearing a somewhat shabby Gaberdine Raincoat over a full body apron and stout walking brogues on her feet. Her hair was always pulled back in a tight bun at the nape of her neck but her eyes shone with fun and kindness, I adored her. Blackberrying with her was an education all on it's own as we tramped the lanes around Gweal-an-top and Sandy Lane. She would show me where a fox had rested in the hedge overnight, a badger's trail, discarded birds' nests. She would turn over stones so we could see woodlice and insects. We would stand very still so we could catch a glimpse of a mouse or a vole. We would watch spiders as they caught flies and eat Sower Sobs together. Later we would return home and together, with my Mother, we would carefully wash the blackberries and make a tart for tea.

It was around this time that Farmer Brush would cut the long, luscious grass in the field opposite our house for hay. It was also nearing Harvest Festival time at Treleigh Church where the steps to the altar would be covered in baskets and boxes of glowing fruits and vegetables. My Mother would order a Harvest Basket from Mr and Mrs Pearce, Grocers at East End. Not only did the Pearces make the best ice cream in the whole, wide world but they created amazing baskets of fruit for Harvest Festivals festooned with crepe paper rosettes, bows and streamers. The contents of fruit were then carefully covered in bright red cellophane. These baskets were a work of art all on their own!

September, every year, held great excitement in our house. It was during this month that my Auntie Gwen in America would send a large parcel of clothes she had collected from her very well off friends. My Mother and my Aunts would gather over hot cups of tea and dissect the contents together. Silk blouses, tweed skirts, hats and 'very American' jewellery would spill out all over the floor. I loved every second, touching, trying on and so much laughter. No one liked the rather brassy jewellery but I thought it amazing.

The items would be altered, buttons changed, bows removed but everything found a new life. The new, altered outfits would see their first outing at the Harvest Supper. Even the gobstopper sized earrings in gold finishes would be added to the dressing up box where I could swirl and romance in my dreams. Such simple but very fond memories from a happy childhood.


We are really looking forward to being with you again and enjoying a great evening together.

A year or so ago I heard on Radio Cornwall an item called "Minack Monday" covering information and news about the Minack Theatre. The person being interviewed commented that some people go to the shows dressed in t-shirt and shorts, not giving a thought to the fact that they will be on the side of a cliff at 10 o'clock at night!

We've been there and seen it happen! A young couple sat beside us on a lovely sunny afternoon and they were dressed in t-shirts and shorts, with no back up clothing except a picnic rug with waterproof backing. The mist rolled in and they began to feel the chill so pulled the rug around them. But with a waterproof backing it didn't quite do the job and they left at half time!

When we arrived theatre goers were unloading assorted items of comfort; cushions, sleeping bags, even a complete set of upholstered cushions from a settee. All were manoeuvred down the cliffs by the incoming audience wrapped in various layers of clothing, keeping their options open depending on the weather. This was followed by the 'digging in process'. Blankets, sleeping bags and cushions were arranged and re-arranged to give maximum protection against the possibility of cold later in the evening.

A family in front of us had a full picnic hamper, with wine, and proceeded to eat their way through the entire first half of the performance! The picnicking and the protection against the elements are as much part of the atmosphere of the Minack as the performance itself, as is the mixture of accents....Cornish, American, Canadian and French were the ones we heard.


On one occasion we had to cancel our tickets as I developed sciatica, a very inconvenient complaint to have at any theatre, let alone the Minack!! Sitting for a long time isn't always an option and getting up and walking around definitely isn't an option so we had to forgo the pleasure of an evening under the stars at the Minack.

If you have never visited the Minack Theatre, near Land's End, it is something that should be remedied as soon as possible. An experience not to be missed. Set high above the sea, this open air theatre clings precariously to the Cornish cliffs close to the village of Porthcurno.

Anyone who has ever been to the Minack will know there is nothing quite like it. The whole concept of a visit to the theatre is turned upside down. It is a mixture of two cultures, where the culture of the live stage meets the Cornish culture of the sea and land. Lighted ships pass behind the stage forming a living backdrop which, I am sure, cannot be equalled anywhere, and weatherwise....it pays to be prepared!

# **Baby Blackberrybird**

As I relish the afternoon air, above my head a frantic rustling greets my ear, The bustling fluttering of wings, What do I hear?

An avian battle? The outbreak of territorial war?

No, a sudden silence, a busy peace, a single forager, wrestling with a brambly branch

That's why with Faith, we pray.


For we gain knowledge, constantly






