

#### Rector's notes - OCTOBER 2022

#### The Queen is dead, long live the King!

As I write, we are awaiting the Queen's funeral, and scenes of mourning are being played out in our national life which we'll all remember the rest of our lives. Hundreds of thousands are queuing patiently to see the Queen lying in state in Westminster Hall. Though of course her death was inevitable, and looking back the signs were pretty clear that the end was near, we've been still been shocked that this constant presence in our national life is no longer with us. Tributes for the Queen have poured in from across our nation, the Commonwealth and the whole world. I've been struck on the one hand by world leaders paying tribute to her, like President Macron of France, saying that really she was "'The Queen' – a beacon of continuity and steadfastness to people across the world". But also on the other hand, by stories of normal people who spoke briefly to the Queen, but sensed her genuine interest and concern for their ordinary lives.

A great deal has quite rightly been made of the Queen's deep personal Christian faith, and in particular how the example of Jesus shaped her own attitude towards her life of service and duty. But less had been said about how her faith, and the prayers of millions of people, may have formed and shaped her into the person who has managed to carry out all that duty and service.

King Charles, having served the longest apprenticeship in history, now has many eyes turned on him. Among many other roles, he is now supreme governor of the Church of England, and in his first televised speech to the nation I was really impressed at how he articulated his own Christian faith. He has spoken too of how he believes his work must include protecting the space for faith itself, and respecting those who follow other spiritual paths, as well as those who seek to live their lives in accordance with secular ideals.

But his Coronation itself will be in the context of Christian worship, and I believe we all have a part to play in how our new King manages to exercise his duties, and to be sustained in his faith. And that is in our prayers for him. Prayer makes a difference. Our continuing prayers can really can help enable King Charles to fulfil all of God's purposes for him, in this changing and uncertain world.

Everlasting God, we pray for our new King. Bless his reign and the life of our nation. Help us to work together so that truth and justice, harmony and fairness flourish among us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

#### **RECENT EVENTS**

As I listened to the accounts of the queue of people waiting to pay their respects to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, I recognised all of the landmarks that the thousands of people were passing. London Bridge, the Globe Theatre, Tate Modern, the London Aquarium, the old County Hall, Westminster Bridge and finally Westminster Hall. I wondered if I would have joined the gueue had that been possible. If my diary had been empty, or, if I could have cancelled the services, visits and events that were in the diary. Why didn't I go? I kept thinking of the words of a wise priest: "whatever is in the diary first, that is what you do, and always remember that meeting, that visit is vitally important for that person or family, they have waited for that moment and it must be honoured!!" As it was, I stayed in Redruth and was grateful to Ron, who had arranged to show the state funeral on a large television in Christchurch. There were just a few of us, but, we were together and shared that moment in history. I can remember another royal death, that of Diana Princess of Wales. I woke up early in the morning of Sunday August 31. The death of the Princess was all over the news, flowers were being put at the gates of Buckingham Palace, her image was on railings, the nation was distraught. The death of Diana was tragic. Church congregations increased and national mourning reached fever pitch. This time was different, Diana's death was a life cut-short, the Queen's death came after a life of duty and service, Diana's death stamped on hope, the Queen's death reminded us all of the hope the Queen had brought to the nation. Her Christian faith a pattern for her life.

As we remember both Diana, Princess of Wales, and her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II so we also remember those whom we have loved but see no longer. Those whose lives have led us to where we are today. Together, may they rest in peace, and rise in glory.

All of these projects seek to work, not only with the children and young people but also with their families. baptisms, weddings and funerals all are arranged through these meetings, and God's love is shared and touches the lives of many.

Those who attend may not come to church regularly, but they will know that they are beloved of God and that the church, perhaps just briefly was there for them and enriched their lives. It was Mother Teresa of Calcutta who said "cast your stone into the water and watch the ripples go out; you may never know where the ripples will go, what they will touch or where they will lead".

There is an ancient proverb that says: "Do not be afraid to sow, because of the birds". As we struggle to 'grow the church' never forget that what you sow may be reaped by someone else, by another church. What is important is that we keep reaching out into the world and reflecting God's love to all whom we meet.

#### ST STEPHEN'S TRELEIGH

On Sunday 4th September the church was almost full for the Baptism of Edith Rose Knowles during the 11.15am Informal Holy Communion Service, a wonderfully uplifting celebration.

On Friday 9th September, following the sad news of the passing of Queen Elizabeth II, St. Stephen's Church was open for people to come in and pay their respects to our wonderful Queen. The bell was tolled 96 times at 12 noon, one toll for each year of her life. Many Treleigh School children and their parents came in and over 60 votive candles were lit near the framed prayer & beautiful photo of Her Majesty. May she rest in peace and rise in glory. The Healing Service at 7pm that evening was led by Reverend Margaret and Fr. Peter and a candle was lit and prayers were said especially for the Royal family in their grief and for our new King Charles III.

It was with regret but with respect to HM Queen Elizabeth II, that The Great British Tea Party due to be held on Saturday 17th September was postponed. It is hoped that we can hold this in the not too distant future.

On Sunday 18th September, the 11.15am service was one of Thanksgiving for the life and steadfast duty of our late Queen Elizabeth II. RIP. Our thanks go to Caspar and Curate Chris for the meaningful Order of Service which was projected on the big screen and for showing the wonderful light-hearted video of HM Queen Elizabeth II having tea with Paddington Bear on the occasion of Her Platinum Jubilee Celebration. The address given by Deacon Chris was heartfelt and told of our late Queen's great Faith, Love and duty to God and to her people. The service ended with The National Anthem in tribute to King Charles III. After which, Caspar invited people to light a votive candle in front of the Altar where a beautiful photo of our late Queen was displayed together with a prayer. Thanks go to Lynn for playing both the organ and keyboard so beautifully for some of our late Queen's favourite hymns and also to Carol and Doreen for the wonderful floral arrangements throughout the church and porch On Saturday 1st October from 10am - 12 noon, we will be tidying our Churchyard and all help of able bodies will be gratefully accepted and rewarded with a hot drink and biscuits. Please bring tools and gloves if you have them however, there will be spares available to use. On Sunday 2nd October at 11.15am we will be holding our Harvest Festival and being the 1st Sunday in the month will be an Informal Holy Communion Service. Harvest offerings will be for the Foodbank.

#### The Engagement Ring.

During the late 50s we had moved from our treasured little home to a much larger, sprawling house; number 7 Coach Lane. We had left behind a road of very neat semi detached houses all complete with immaculately kept front gardens, that is, except ours!

Neither of my parents could be described as "gardeners". The grass got cut simply because it became too long to find missing toys or my darling dachshund, Fritz.

Number 7 Coach Lane presented a new problem. It had a large garden and even larger vegetable plot. The latter was easily sorted and a gardener named Bert was employed. Bert was one of those amazing people who charmed all the wild life around him and I would watch him, spellbound, as birds fed from his hand. The only issue with Bert was that his Cornish Accent was so thick we struggled to understand anything he said!

One summer lunchtime I noticed that there seemed to be a lot of activity in the garden. Both my Father and my Mother seemed to be pointing at the wall, now completely enveloped in brambles. It would appear that my Mother's Engagement Ring was missing from its box which she kept in the middle draw of her dressing table. My little sister had been upstairs playing at dressing up and it was suspected that she had taken it out and put it on. As I remember, it all seemed a little vague but the search was on!

The following day my Father had taken drastic action. Somewhere or someone had lent him a Flame Thrower which he felt was ideal for disposing of all the brambles so the search could continue. It was amazing to watch as my Mother hacked away at the highest brambles with a scythe, followed by my Father shouting, "Keep Back", while he shot the flame thrower at the wall. Flames shot high above the wall incinerating everything in it's path including the plastic, roped clothes line that spanned the garden and all Bert's stored canes that had been neatly cut and tied.

Sadly, the small, solitaire Engagement Ring was never found but my Mother never gave up hope and would often be found scouring the overgrown boarders and the now disused Goldfish Pond.

Years later, after we had moved from Coach Lane, the empty Engagement Ring box still kept it's place in her dressing table drawer. She often hoped that one day, someone would find it and it would bring them the pleasure it had bought her. I like to think so.

We had a very mixed discussion about **This is Happiness** mainly because some of us hadn't finished the book and others didn't want to spoil the ending! It was certainly interesting to read about a sleepy village in Ireland, which some related to their own experiences of Cornish Village life back in the 50's, the diverse characters and the relationships within the village alongside new relationships with those who had come to bring electricity to the whole village. Whilst some thought the book was a little boring at times it is well worth preserving to an interesting conclusion.

We meet again on October 7<sup>th</sup> to share our thoughts on The Circling Sky by Neil Ansell. A non-fiction book about the seasonal changes in the New Forest, a much loved area by the author who was born nearby. With beautiful sightings and observations of birds, trees, butterflies, insects and landscape this is also a reflective memoir on childhood, on the history of one of the most ancient and important habitats and on the gypsies who lived there for centuries, and were subsequently expelled to neighbouring cities.

In November we are looking at Meredith, Alone by Claire Alexander about a woman who has not left her home for 1,214 days. Meredith is a wonderful character – funny, strong and relatable – and the slow reveal about why she's become a recluse is gripping.

# EXCERPTS FROM A DAILY JOURNAL by Michael Tangye

On retiring in 1995, following 42yrs in the Health Service, Pam and I visited New Zealand for 8 weeks where we stayed with Pam's brother, briefly at Devonport, Auckland, where he was the City Planner. The tour that followed to both North and South Island involved a variety of transport—bus, touring bus, 'shuttle' bus, train and lorry. Each evening the days events were recorded in this writer's journal, extracts of which might be of interest to others. It was not surprising that we encountered so many links with Cornwall with its mining history, emigration and even art!

Nov 10th 1995 Pam and I have not slept for over two days. Following the break of four hours at Los Angeles, we filed back on board the plane and were joined by a young woman from Boston who ravenously devoured her meal, pulled a cover over her head and slept throughout the rest of the flight to Auckland—we were quite envious! The lady checking our names on landing wore a badge showing that she was called 'B Tregunna' - obviously of Cornish descent!

Nov 11th 'Still no sleep' West to the 'Auckland Dormain' in the evening, a huge open area of parkland surrounded by hills. This was the venue for free entertainment attended by 200,000 people who come in droves to enjoy music by a large band and the Auckland Symphony Orchestra. The surprise was the presence of Nelson Mandela who addressed the audience. He was accompanied by the Prime Minister of New Zealand. The former had to face the 'Haka' performed by a gathering of Maori "warriors". We returned at 12.30pm for a sleep at last!

<u>Nov 14th</u> ...the New Zealander's are very conscious of fitness judging by the large number of fast walkers and joggers. When picnicking in the Park we were surprised at lunchtime when a number of 'white-collar' workers and street cleaners entered to remove their shirts and commenced to play rugby—such is the enthusiasm which brings such success to the All Blacks team!

Nov 16th Visited the Auckland Museum. The Maori section occupied our interest for two hours. Magnificent wood carvings done with stone tools and an immense war canoe, 82ft long, which held 100 warriors made in 1836. it was once blown apart by the Marines during a period of tribal wars to prevent its use—we also witnessed dancing, greetings etc performed by indigenous Maoris, who rightly stressed that they were the true race of New Zealand.

We visited the City Art Gallery and were surprised to see the large, well known painting of the Newlyn School of Art by Frank Bramley (1857-1915), 'For such is the Kingdom of Heaven'. This shows the funeral of a child in Newlyn, the coffin borne by ladies, all in white. Another painting by Rita Angus is of 'Betty Curnow'!

<u>Nov 17th</u> 'To Rotorua by bus and pleasant motel. Found the geo-thermal area. Everywhere sulphurous steam rose from the ground with bubbling, steaming ponds in gardens, and even in the lake which occupied the vast crater of an extinct volcano—Lake Rotorua—noticed bubbles on the shore line. I put my fingers into a wayside stream and found it to be unbearably hot!






