Old John was busy pulling on his ancient but well loved sweater. The sun had gone in and the Church was reacting, as it always did, turning chilly almost at once. "Ready?" he called to Sally noticing that she looked somewhat distracted, not present. "Everything ok?" he asked. Sally pointed to the blanket. "Our visitor left this behind." Old John ambled over to Sally. "Looks like just an old blanket to me, shouldn't worry too much about that. Anyway, if it's that important he will probably be back for it. The church is open all day. I'd leave it, just in case.". Sally shrugged. "you're the boss." They both laughed knowing that Old John had been Church Warden for a very long time, probably too long.

Day after day, week after week the red blanket sat, neatly folded, on the pew, unclaimed. Sally often glanced at it as she passed, remembering it's tall, dark owner and silently hoping that one day perhaps he would return.

The sun had already lost its warmth and Autumn was shaking the leaves from the trees when the heating in the church just gave up the ghost. Sally quietly slipped in beside them saying nothing but just extended her arms towards the baby. Mum looked relieved. Almost immediately the baby stopped crying and, after a struggle to find it's mouth, quietly sucked it's thumb until it fell fast asleep in Sally's arms.

Anyone who wishes to take part in the walk should meet at the Basset Stamps at 10.30am on Sunday 22nd September and be prepared for a little damp underfoot. The church service will start at around 11.15-11.30am, when the walkers arrive. Pasties and saffron buns have been ordered for lunch, so please do join in if you can. We are hoping that there might be some Mexican visitors, this being the bicentenary of the Cornish miners going to Mexico to open up the silver mines after the country's independence. Some of the St Euny burials include people who made up part of the Cornish Diaspora in Mexico.

The bells now make melody for the special benefit of the departed Druids, the whole of the town being deprived the while of the intense pleasure this jingle affords.

LAY PIONEER

Lucie would like to thank everyone who has supported her during her training to become commissioned as a Lay Pioneer, particularly the willing group of volunteers, who starred in videos and focus groups, and the PCC.

The formal commissioning service of lay leaders will be on Sunday 6th October at 4pm at St Kea Church, Truro TR3 6AE led by the Archdeacon. It would mean a lot to Lucie to have your support there.

After being commissioned, Lucie will have the title of Lay Pioneer. Their work is with groups who feel isolated, and those on the edges. Their role is to meet and to walk alongside people where they are and see where God is working, and to be based within the community in which they find themselves so that, together, they might encounter where the Holy Spirit is already at work. Please do ask about this work when you see Lucie as they continue to be a valued part of the worshipping community in and around all the Redruth Churches, and as a member for the Laity of Truro Diocesan Synod.

Lucie is one of three people from her year group to have been approved by the Diocese of Truro to continue their study towards becoming a Licenced Lay Pioneer, which is the same level of qualification as a Licenced Lay Reader. This will be through the Church Mission Society, affiliated with the University of Durham.


THANK YOU ALL for the thank you

I really don't deserve to be singled out because the ministry team all worked hard and worked together throughout the transition but thank you on their behalf too.



Jojo Moyes fascinating novel Someone Else's Shoes was a delight to read with plenty of humorous events throughout – even the very beginning with the accidental 'swap' of gym bags from where the whole story developed. All tied up in the mystery of the high heeled red shoes. What a difference they made to Sam who had to wear them and to Nisha who couldn't because Sam picked up the wrong bag. Who would have thought clothes and shoes could make such a difference to the lives of both women. Well worth the read! Look out for it on St Andrew's Book Club Shelves.

The Great Western Beach is completely different – a memoir of a Cornish childhood between the wars by Emma Smith. Healing Services have been taking place in the Parish of Redruth for a long time now so it is surprising that few people attend, especially when these take place in each of our churches in rotation. Fr Peter and I are mystified as to why. All of us are in need of healing in many different ways. There are many among us in our communities who are suffering in body, mind or spirit who would benefit from the peace and quietness of this service. Yes, we might not see dramatic healings (but you never know what God will do!) but those who come do experience a wonderful blessing and may indeed recognise healing has occurred but do not mention it, it is after all, very personal.

There is no expectation to participate in the laying on of hands and anointing whilst quiet prayer is said, if anyone wishes to come and just absorb the blessing of peace and stillness. You may come for yourself or for someone you are concerned about wherever they may live. You may or may not want to say why you have come, again there is no obligation. You may wish to bring someone but are not sure what either of you will make of it. You may come only once or regularly but rest assured it is an opportunity to just **be**, in the presence of God, being open to the healing love of Jesus.

Why not give healing a try and if you have any concerns please do speak with Fr Peter or me, we are only too happy to allay your fears and worries, and if there is a specific reason you don't come we would like to hear it.

THE BISHOP OF TRURO DISCRETIONARY FUND

Following the licensing of Reverend Rebecca Bell at St Andrew's church, Redruth on Monday 2 September, a collection of £241.62 was raised for the above fund.

My way to Compostela Day 13 Part 1 Villafranca de Montes de Oca to Cardeñuela - 25 Km

Villafranca roughly translates to "home of the Francs" who passed this way in the 9th Century on their pilgrimage and returned to settle in this area. The Spanish translation for Goose is Oca, so you could say that we stayed at an Alburgue "In the home of the Francs at the foot of Goose Mountain". For the 9th Century pilgrims this would have been a place of danger from being robbed or murdered by the bandits who lived on the mountain, luckily for us we did not encounter any geese or bandits. As today's walk started with a steady climb of over a 1000 metres and a total accumulated distance of 25Km we decided to make an early start and forgo breakfast. Leaving the Alburgue we turned right which took us immediately onto the route to climb steadily up through an Oak forest that in turn, gave way to Pine woods before we reached the Fuente de Mojapan (moisten bead fountain). I expect that early pilgrims would have softened their crust of bread at this point? From here we had a slightly less steep climb to reach the mountain plateau at 1020 metres and out into a wide Pine and Oak forest. After walking through the forest for around 2.3Km, we came to a picnic area and a Civil war monument. Monumento de los Caidos a chilling reminder of the fallen during the Spanish Civil war. We stopped here for a few minutes to read the inscription on the plaque, to drink our water and have a quick snack. Always have a fall-back snack in your pack, in Andrew's case a whole month's worth of snacks! As the others moved on I lingered to have a few more minutes of reflection, to say a prayer for my Father who fought in WW2 and who, like thousands of Irish men before him, left their homeland to fight for another country against Fascism and Dictatorship. I recalled one such survivor of the Spanish Civil War, a patient I was caring for when I worked at Tehidy Hospital in 1979. He too was an Irish man who in 1937 gave up his medical training to go and fight against oppression. I often thought of what he felt on his return to Ireland in late 1938 invalided home, minus his left arm, never to return to his medical studies. Sadly he died of TB associated with long term alcohol abuse. Joining up with the group again we descended steeply to cross the Arroyo Peroja stream by a footbridge then climbed up to the summit of Goose mountain at 1,150Metres. Hope you have remembered how to convert metres to feet? From here the track widens out as we continue for another 4.9Km before passing a wayside cross that served as the marker for our 3.6Km descent to the village of San Juan de Ortega with a population of around 20 souls, but most important to us, a bar/café and our designated breakfast stop. If any of you have ever seen the film 'The Way' with Martin Sheen, the scene in the film where he has his backpack stolen was filmed outside this bar, a far distance from the city it was supposed to represent! The Village bears the name of a disciple of Santo Domingo and like him he did great works for the pilgrims on this route, building hostels, hospitals and churches. San Juan is a designated stop in the Guide book if you have stayed in Belorado, but as you may remember we are making a point of not stopping in large towns or cities if we can avoid it, and in doing so we hope we are supporting the smaller towns, villages and hamlets. So after a sustaining late breakfast, that did not involve the traditional bread and garlic soup of this region, we headed out, back on the route that would take us towards Burgos.
