Sun Kissed

While on holiday this week, I have been engaging in some quiet, reflective morning prayer and listening to podcasts in between swims in the Adriatic Sea and the embrace of the hot sun (apologies, Cornwall 2). I am experiencing a profound sense of calm and peace for the first time in a while, allowing my mind to wander and be free from the demands of everyday life.

I share this not to boast, as I understand that the weather back home might not be ideal. Instead, I want to reflect on the insights that this tranquillity has brought to me and encourage us to contemplate today.

In a podcast, I'm currently listening to, the speaker (Rob Bell) discusses a story from Mark's gospel where Jesus, after healing numerous people and attracting a large crowd in need of help, does something unexpected – he leaves. Instead of doing more, he moves on. His disciples express their confusion, given the overwhelming need, but Jesus responds, "Let's go somewhere else."

When the demand seems highest, Jesus chooses a different path. He retreats to ground himself, recharge, and pray. He doesn't conform to the world's expectations; instead, he pauses, separates himself, and gathers his strength through prayer. This gospel model guides us in how we should live our lives.

Today, we live in a culture and a world that often suggests we should do more and give more when the need is great. While this is sometimes true, it shouldn't be the norm for every day, as it doesn't align with how Jesus lived. Jesus' model.

Interestingly, the disciples' understanding is limited to the immediate demand right in front of them. Sometimes it is easier to keep doing, rather than to stop. It can feel better to keep 'doing', however, God doesn't ask for our 'doing' rather than our 'being'. This is something that those who serve others must be aware of, as many of us fall into the trap of only addressing the visible demand without pause.

Upon reflection, I ask myself, "Why have I been feeling so exhausted?" This has been a long year filled with change. There is a lot to take stock of, a lot to ponder and to give thanks for. Additionally, what should we do with the constant demands? Perhaps I'm simply tired of criticizing myself for feeling tired. I've adopted a little catchphrase for myself: "If you can't stop, you're stuck."

In the Psalms, we're advised to "be still and know that I am God." How can we truly know God if we don't take moments of stillness? To stop and listen to what He has to say. However, achieving stillness isn't always easy. It requires intentionality; it's both a choice and something that goes beyond choice. It's the way of Jesus – a way, a truth and a life.

Are we feeling stuck today? What might need to stop for you? Where do you need to find stillness? Perhaps in your stillness, you can experience the love of God, his peace, and his sun-kissed embrace.

Amen.

ST EUNY

Our last Communion Service at which Caspar will have officiated was on Sunday 20th August. 'Mining Sunday' which takes place on Sunday 10 September will follow the usual pattern of a reflective walk from Basset Stamps, via St Euny mine to the church. Departure from Basset Stamps is at 10.00am and the service at St Euny will be at 11.30am. A pasty lunch will follow so we hope that as many as can will come and help remember this core aspect of our heritage.

Bishop Hugh's visit on 19th July for the Confirmation and re-affirmation was a most joyous affair and we were very pleased to see the church so full. Many people stayed afterward for refreshments and conversation which gave us a good opportunity to socialise. Thanks to Anya for a superb Confirmation cake which had three separate layers, all of which were eaten with relish.

As you enter St Euny you will see a white-glazed pottery stoup on the table to your right. This has been created by Lucie, our churchwarden as she learnt and developed her new-found skill as a potter this year, and is a very attractive addition to the church. If you look closely you will see the Paschal Candle holder, also created by Lucie for the church and for which we are grateful. This is in the chancel on a stand in full view and holds this year's Easter Candle. Both of these have been blessed by the bishop and we hope that they will serve us for some time.

We now have an entry on the 'Celtic Quiet Places' website with some information about the church and facilities. A lot of new churches have been added over the past few weeks, so there is now a lot more to see. We have committed to remaining open until the end of September during daytime, but if anyone has thoughts about the continuation of this, please do let us know.

Having had several summer events and keeping the Open Cafe open has attracted people into the church for social communion, Holy Communion and to look at the architecture as well as pay respects to relatives and ancestors. ST ANDREW REDRUTH

Looking Back - one hundred and forty years:

On Thursday 26th July 1883 the ceremony for the laying of the Foundation Stone of St Andrew's church was held. A large gathering attended but there was some reduction in the scale of the building compared to the original plan. The building sits on land donated by Lord Clinton, who gave the church three years to make a decision to go ahead. The Rev. J.W.Lane, Rector of Redruth, was the driving force in the church, feeling that with the expansion of the town to the south and the Parish Church sitting about a mile from the main residential area, a mission church was justified.

The accommodation was described as providing a school room suitable for 400 children and a congregation of 380. The school room is the 'crypt' – imagine 400 children fitting in there! The church building covered the four western arches of the nave as we know it today, before the extension of the last arcade arch to the east. £3,400 had been subscribed toward an estimated £4,000 contract price, along with furnishings etc estimated to cost around £500. The ceremony began at the Chapel of Ease in Chapel Street, with a service of Holy Communion at 8.30am and assembly of the clergy at eleven o'clock at Druids Hall. Bishop Wilkinson, Rev. J.W.Lane, Rector of Redruth, and 21 other clergy were present, representing many of the nearby parishes. The band of the Redruth Rifle Volunteers led the procession to the site of St Andrew's, flags flying and decorated streets celebrating the event with an evergreen arch spanning the road near the site. A platform by the church held the bishop and guests, Foundation Stones were laid by Mrs Basset of Tehidy and Lord Clinton, who delivered an address. Following this a luncheon was held at Tabbs Hotel (the site of Iceland shop) on Fore Street. Many toasts were proposed and particular gratitude was expressed for Mr Basset who had given £500 toward the costs and Lord Clinton who was visiting for the first time in 20 years, this being his first public act in Redruth, although he was landlord to much of the town and had interests in many of the mines in the parish. Dr Benson, by then archbishop of Canterbury, was praised for his warm support for the project when he was Bishop of Truro and who sent his warm greetings to any friends who might care for him in the parish. He also mentioned that bishops were 'now freely criticised' and he observed that "they did not shrink from it as far as he could judge" - a reminder, perhaps, that little has changed? It is pleasing to know that we continue the active service envisaged at that time. Over the summer the Monday morning warm Space has had a two-week break and commences again on Monday 21st August. Thursday toddlers are on their summer holiday but 'Come Rain or Shine' has been organised by Fran on Thursday mornings during August, as an offering to young people.

A Creation Care service will be held in the Cathedral at 2.00pm on Saturday 16th September with music from Cornwall Youth Choir and presentations of the Kernow Green Church Awards. Joan and David Doble continue to do this excellent work in our parish and would love to see some of us there.



More Change in Redruth Benefice

In 2024 not only will we be welcoming a new Rector but we have just had notification this month about two other changes.

Redruth PCC becomes a charity

Following the merger of the two St Andrew's and St Euny it became necessary for Redruth PCC to register as a charity because it's income already is or will soon be over £100,000.

Our registration has been confirmed and the charity number is 1204231. This number will appear on all official documents and the letterhead. We will continue to be subject to oversight and supervision by the Church of England but we will also need to observe charity law and our details will appear on the Charity Commission website.

Redruth Benefice becomes a single parish

Caspar has now received confirmation that the Church Commissioners have accepted the plan to merge Treleigh and Lanner parishes into Redruth PCC to form a single parish. This will make administration easier in future with fewer meetings and a single set of accounts. Congregations from the two St Andrew's and St Euny will already be aware of the practical implications of the merger but for Lanner and Treleigh I highlight below some of the actions required on or before 1 January 2024:

- Transfer bank balances to Redruth PCC
- Change direct debits and standing orders to Redruth PCC
- Donors who pay by monthly standing order will be asked to complete a new standing order form payable to Redruth PCC and send this to their bank.
- If the donor is a taxpayer they will be asked to sign a new gift aid declaration
- Donors using the Parish Giving Scheme will not need to do either of the above but they will be asked to sign a letter confirming that from 1 January 2024 their donations can be paid to Redruth PCC

Please contact me if you have any questions about the process. In order that the individuality of each church is not lost I will continue to record income and expenditure separately and show the results of the five churches individually and in total.



They meet up some years later on Cyprus and return to London together to begin a new life. It is from the perspective of the fig tree that much of the story is told – a tale of love, loss and generational trauma involving their daughter Ada, a teenager.

What a beautiful world we live in surrounded by the sea With just below the surface are rocks for us to see

It doesn't matter where we go the water gives us pleasure Whether swimming below the surface or on top at our leisure

There are also extremes of temperature from cold to very hot While down on the rocky bed below we just wish to see the lot.

Paddling in our canoe up the Essequibo watching mosquitos skim the surface But could not put our hands in water as the piranhas would hurt us.

Going across the Atlantic with pelican flying in the sky When suddenly from down below flying fish we did espy

Swimming in the sea was a relief from all the heat But could not put a foot down as the coral would hurt our feet.

Up north it is a serene view to watch broken ice sheets glide along Hiding the danger below of the depth that keeps them strong.

In the harbours where the fishing boats are tied up by the pier A whale from down below lets out a water spout to warn that he is near

After all this travelling where would I rather be But back home, here in Cornwall surrounded by the sea

Our rivers feed the oceans and we have nothing to ever fear Until the salmon swarm and go to jump the weir

The pool at Porthowan is such a lovely place to swim Until there is a flood tide and covers it all in

The rocks that were covered in bladderack suddenly are gone But the limpets are delighted as their food has come along

Childhood memories of jumping over the rolling waves And of fishing in the rocky pools for crabs along the way.

The inspiration for this poem came from looking out to sea Whoa - a dolphin surfaced from the rocks below to give me so much glee

A Redruth man in Australia in the 1850's by Michael Tangye

Renowned for their skills of hard rock mining, Cornish miners took them to the world. With the discovery of gold in South Australia in the 1850's, at a time when some mines in Cornwall were closing, many emigrated to that distant land, until by 1865 it was estimated that 42.5% of the population in that region were Cornish.

In 1853 the Penzance newspaper, the Cornish Telegraph, published regular accounts sent to them by both emigrant miners and families in Cornwall, recounting their experiences. One such was Josias Sincock, a young man from Redruth who wrote to his parents from New South Wales in early November 1852. He had sailed from Liverpool on board the 'Eldorado' on August 9th a journey of three months:-

"We arrived here last Tuesday after a smart passage. The accounts are, so the old diggers say, 'unfavourable', which means you can only clear 20 shillings a day—if I can do that I shall be pretty well pleased. If the diggings fail, I can make from 3 to 4 pounds per week from other sources. Tell anyone who is coming to bring only a carpet—bag (note:- the traditional source for carrying clothing and essential items overseas at that time). Clothes are cheap; flour is very dear. Bread is 2 shillings for 4 lbs, meat pretty cheap, vegetables pretty dear. We have pitched a tent on the Yarra river, and start for the diggings tomorrow".

Josias wrote another letter to his parents in 1853:- "Made another trial at the gold field, a little success, but not enough to remunerate me for my labour. Most are in the same position. Upwards of 1000 men are working in the Canalaslian Gully where the large nugget was found—but not twenty were paid for their exertions Like Cornish mines, to one productive there are twenty unproductive. Most earn about ten shillings a day arriving with great expectations of getting a fortune, others returning crest-fallen, and trudge back to Melbourne. Gentlemen of high degree and low degree were seen at work with the lowest of the low, like the navvies on the railroads of England.

One house here of three to four bedrooms costs £150 a year to rent. £17,000 was paid for a public house on the road to the diggings— publicans thrive! Any man of careful and industrial habits stands a better chance here than at home.

In going into a shipping agents office who should I see but a townsman in the good diggers dress; and great was my surprise when he told me that my brother, Thomas, was in the police reporting office with a salary of four guineas a week which will be increased in a month by two. Carpenters earn twenty-twenty five shillings a day, and other trades likewise" In Redruth at the time Mr Edwin Tyrell gave a slide show in the Town Hall in Penryn Street of a voyage to Australia and travels to the gold fields. It created great interest 'particularly to those who have husbands, sons and relations in that land of promise'. 'For many it would prove to be not as promising as was advertised!'

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
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
