

#### <u>Rector's Notes – FEBUARY 2020</u>

#### <u>Growing Your Church – an update</u>

Last month I wrote about our important initiative for 2020 *Growing Your Church*, and I'm pleased to say we have members of all our five churches involved. By way of an encouragement here's a taste of what we've been up to:



In a rough survey of each church we have worked out that we have many hundreds or in some cases many thousands of 'warm' connections with people in our community – people who come into our churches each year for a whole variety of reasons (hall users, concert attenders, people at weddings, baptisms and funerals, our own community events that we organise, school groups etc). We are a known thing, and that is so much easier than being a group no one knows about.

One of the positive challenges of this is working out ways to 'turn up the temperature' a bit at this list of events: eg from the front, simply explaining that all people are welcome to come to our services (some people don't actually realise this); providing an opportunity for people to ask for prayer (via a prayer tree, or book); giving a very brief testimony about how God has been at work in someone's life; making links between groups (members of toddlers being invited to come to a Sunday school provision, if we have one). What other ways might there be to let these '*warm connection people*' know more clearly that they are loved by God, and that God wants to be part of their lives?

We've also had a chance to think about what the obstacles are to people coming to church. Are we sure people know what and where our building actually is? What sort of welcome do people receive? Do new people have a chance to quickly make friends with particular congregation members? Do new people feel able to make an active contribution to the life of the church (rather than think that's only for 'old hands')?

One person at the course described a young mum at the St Andrew's Tiddlers group in the Crypt talking about donations to the costs of Tiddlers. "Couldn't the church contribute?" they asked. "We *are* the church!" came the reply. Somehow this young mum had failed to understand that this whole group is a church group. There is a big task for us to do in making in clearer what we already do in the community.

It's still not too late to join the rest of this course! Otherwise watch this space for more examples of how our churches can grow, and are growing. Meantime, please pick up a special prayer card, and please keep praying for our churches to grow.

#### This month Revd Graham tries something scary!

I have some happy, early memories of church but, having grown up with church, I can't really remember the *first* time I ever went.

So, recently I have been trying to imagine what it might feel like for someone who has never been to a church before. What might they feel if they think about church? What must that be like? How could I put myself in their shoes for a bit?

So, to step out of my comfort zone I decided to visit... a betting shop.

Yes, a betting shop! Now, for some that might not be out of their comfort zone, but it certainly was for me! The way I felt just at the thought of going there must be just the way many people in our town feel about walking through the doors of the church! There are so many parallels; here is some of what went through my mind :

I don't know what I'm supposed to do there. Where do I stand and what will I say? I can't really see the attraction in these kinds of places anyway.

I wonder if the people in there would look down on me, a stranger, for going in.

And what if I meet someone I know in there?!

No, what if someone I know sees me coming out!

And what about my family, no-one from my family has ever been to a bookies before – what would they think?

That nervous feeling I had about going somewhere brand new – that is how many people feel about church. We do well to remind ourselves that it is not always easy for people to come to church on a Sunday morning.

In the end, I plucked up the courage and went in.

I spoke to the young man behind the counter and asked him if he had a few minutes to talk. We got chatting: a really nice guy, he lives locally in Illogan and will be moving away soon with his fiancé who is going to university up country.

I asked him to show me around and he talked me through the different areas: dogs, horses, overseas races, virtual horses, football, rugby and slot machines. I can't say I was tempted to have a flutter, but I did meet some lovely people who have found a place of community and friendship. I went there not to judge or condemn, but with an open mind. I wondered how we can pray for and better serve our town.

Two things stand out for me: First, to remind ourselves what it feels like for the outsider to go somewhere where they don't know the culture or whether they will be welcomed.

And second, how can we help our friends, family and neighbours to overcome their own fears about coming with us to church? How can we help to invite them in, and make them feel welcome?

So here's an idea for us: Let's keep doing things that challenge our thinking, things that stretch our imagination and grow our faith. God is at work in his world; we just have to step out and join in.

#### **ST ANDREW REDRUTH**

In her article last month Fran reviewed the activities at St Andrews during 2019 ending with the very busy Christmas programme which included 5 school concerts, a RAOST concert and five performances of Bev Lyn's Dancing to Bethlehem, a total audience of over 4,000.

Then of course there were our own services starting with the carol service featuring Dhiworth an Gollon and the sensational Redruth Town band and of course large quantities of mince pies and mulled wine. Then on Christmas Eve the happy chaos of the children's crib service which was again followed by many mince pies all made by Sue Pearce and finally the moving service of candlelit Midnight Mass with Father Graham presiding for the first time.

The collections from these three services totalling £600 have been donated to the Oarsome Foursome who are 4 ladies(now 3) from Cornwall and Devon who are rowing the Atlantic to support 3 local charities. They are still half way across the Atlantic as I write and we pray for their safe arrival in Antigua next month.

Putting the ups and downs of 2019 behind us we now look forward to a new year and a new decade. During January and February many of us are talking about ways to Grow our Church by attending the course led by Fathers Caspar and Graham. There is representation from across the Benefice but the St Andrew Redruth contingent have been thinking about the many things we already do and how these and some new ideas can grow our church membership and regular worshippers. I have been reminded once or twice already that it is not just about money however as the treasurer who has to pay the many bills that arise from looking after our beautiful building I believe it is important to be able to pay for our clergy and keep the rain out so "every little helps".

Fifteen people came to our **Community Christmas Lunch** on Christmas Day, and we thank everyone who kindly supplied and prepared all the wonderful food.

Our LAMP *First Sunday Evening Event* in January was our Epiphany Carol Service, at which a retiring collection raised £80 for SENSE, the deaf-blind children's charity. Just recently some young friends of ours (25 years of age) who are buying their first home in Manchester, started to attend their local church on a regular, weekly basis. Obviously because they felt called to do so, but also because the church was on the opposite corner to where they live. A clear case for keeping local churches open? We do our best and with God's help and prayer, that is all we can do. Bless all those in our clergy and churches who reach out to the poor, the marginalised, the sick, the community and to each other.

Our busiest service of the year is always our 6pm Lessons and Carols and 2019 was no exception, as we had 120+ in our congregation. It was a pleasure to see friends from our local community and those who attend specific activities in church reading the lessons. From Carrie our new Treasurer, to Nigel from the St Euny Ukes, to those within our community and also of course church members. Thank you all. Our chosen charity for that service was St Petroc's and a wonderful amount of £283 was raised for their cause.

Our other Christmas charity – our Christmas tree card charity was Vision Aid Overseas, a charity very close to the heart of church member Peter Bishop, whom many will know from Bond Street Opticians. A total of £54 was collected for this cause who work to ensure that everyone has access to affordable eye care services and glasses in Africa. Thank you all for your generosity in supporting the above charities.

Life is never easy and we continue to pray for those good friends of St Euny who are not able to be with us at this time due to sickness and frailty – Michael Tangye, Marlene Reseigh, Marlene Riches, Eric Cooper, Margaret Warren, Chris Vining, Pat Ince and Jack Oates. **It is with great sadness** that I write of the passing of Paddy Bradley at the age of 86, a dear and longstanding friend of all of us at Treleigh. Paddy, a British Telecom engineer, and his late wife Margaret, a long time member



of Treleigh congregation and Sunday School teacher, were married in Treleigh Church by Rev. Hawthorne in 1955. Paddy was a Bard of the Cornish Gorsedh, his bardic name being 'Lywans Cuntellyor Resruth' which means 'Collector of Pictures of Redruth' We all have our own individual memories of Paddy and most of us will remember the slide shows he did in Treleigh Hall and the hilarity when one of the audience pointed to an old photograph on the screen and shouted: "That's me!" Paddy brought so many memories to the forefront with his collection of old photographs and postcards of Redruth with his great knowledge and ready wit of the stories behind them. Many of these feature in the books he has written on Redruth and the surrounding area. He would often join us in Treleigh Hall for coffee after the service for a chat and catch-up. We shall miss his presence. He has been a big part of life at Treleigh and Redruth for so long and we are all the richer for knowing him. The thoughts and prayers of all at Treleigh are with his daughter Wendy, son David and all his family at this time.

#### **Money and Statistics**

There is a page to fill in this month's magazine and I have been asked to do this. If you ask an accountant to write something there is an inevitability that this will involve money and numbers.

As well as being the treasurer of St Andrew's Redruth I also look after the Benefice Fees Account which receives fees for funerals and weddings and these are then distributed to the churches with a portion of each fee going to the Diocese to partly cover the cost of the clergy taking the services. In 2020 the usual fee for a funeral including the cost of verger and organist is £358, for a wedding it is £639 with an extra £126 if the bells are rung at St Euny. Weddings are always conducted by a priest but lay readers can also officiate at funerals and occasionally a Methodist minister will officiate as one of our churches takes the place of the now closed RMC.

Now for some statistics in 2019 there were 63 weddings and funerals which were spread across our churches as follows:

In addition to this our clergy and lay readers officiated at 28 separate cremations mainly at Treswithian.


The other figures that seem to take up a large part of my time are relating to MMF (Maintenance and Mission Fund) which is the way the Diocese collects the costs of paying clergy from the parishes.

This is usually collected each month by direct debit and is the main cost your giving and the collection is used for. I also act as financial adviser to the Deanery so get to see the MMF collection figures for the whole Diocese. During 2019 this Benefice was able to pay 88% of the £97,342 that was due, a shortfall of £11,268 which compares favourably with the 79% paid across the Deanery and 72% for the whole Diocese leaving an overall shortfall of over £1.3 million.

I know we all work very hard to fundraise not only for MMF but the many other costs needed to keep our churches in operation but there is always a need for more and the current "Growing your Church" initiative is part of the strategy to make this less painful as hopefully more people equals more money.



#### KENNAL VALE—PONSANOOTH by Míchael Tangye

We are fortunate in Cornwall to have such a variety of scenery and locations in which to explore by walking, particularly on the peninsula of the Lands End and The Lizard. There are both long and pleasing routes to follow, but there is one suitable for those unaccustomed to long walks nearer to Redruth—the fascinating valley of Kennal Vale at Ponsanooth.

Some years ago it was privately owned by Mr Leonard Williams, at the time a churchwarden at St Euny church, who gave this writer and family unrestricted access to its beauty and to record the historical memoirs of the various mills of the formal Kennal Vale Gunpowder Works of the nineteenth century. It was an ideal site with its dense woodland in a deep-sided valley which would restrict the blast of any explosion that might accidentally occur.

The fast flowing Kennal River passes down the valley in summer slow and peacefully, but in winter following heavy rainfall, as a seething mass of white, cascading over large granite boulders, with a roar so great that one can only converse by shouting. It was this water, re-diverted into a water-course along the north side of the valley, that powered the water-wheels of the several gunpowder mills of granite.

It's product became known throughout the world, where the Cornish dominated the mining scene with agencies in America, South America, Australia, South Africa etc. It was a dangerous environment for those employed in its production, one in which explosions occurred due to carelessness and ignoring any safety regulations—one spark often destroyed a mill and killed those working within or near it.

In the 1960's this writer was asked to conduct research and fieldwork and to produce lists of all archaeological features, both ancient and industrial for the parishes of Illogan, Redruth and Stithians. The latter was an enjoyable task which included photographing various fixtures on farms—round threshing houses at Kennal Barton Farm, Trewince Farm and Treweege Barton and gaining information about an earlier way of life in farming. It was then that a detailed study of Kennal Vale was done. Newspapers of the Victorian period spared no details when writing of the terrible injuries and deaths incurred by explosions in the mills; typical was one such in 1841 when a male worker "Martin was blown to pieces. His head was found a quarter of a mile away, and his entrails found dangling from branches."

It is little wonder that stories of ghosts of the past arose quite frequently. In 2002 members of the Ghost Society apparently met at Kennal Vale and it was reported in the West Briton. Amongst them an 'Elaine Flew' a ghost hunter, and a medium who wished to remain anonymous. The latter apparently of great integrity, stated that 'the deeper you move into the Vale, the more oppressive the atmosphere becomes' and she stated that it resembled. St Nectan's Glen near Tintagel, one of the most haunted valleys in Britain. Trevor Kenward, one of the most experienced ghost hunters in the UK, told the late Michael Williams that he had seen a phantom here at very close range; no question of a shadow or trick of light and was convinced that ghosts of old workers do appear and reappear in the Vale. Choose a nice sunny day for a visit!




